The Newfoundlander says :---

"We regret to learn that the accounts from Placentia Bay-Burin especially-show a very destitute condition of great numbers of the people. The unsucessful summer fishery is the principal cause of this state of things, but it is much aggravated by the want of that winter employment, which the Herring fishery in Fortune Bar has afforded for some years past. This fishery is one that has opened up, since the establishment of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States, and its great advantages to the residents of Fortune Bay, and of the west coast generally, have been very marked and gratifying. The Herrings were not more abundant than formerly; but then, there was no market, and the Herring trade is one our to our troubles."

own merchants have never gone heartily intoso the result was next to nothing, in its praztical value to the people. The Reciprocity Treaty, by the abrogation of the duty on foreign fish imported into the States, at once opened up a market there, and during the past few years, numbers of American vessels have regularly visited Fortune Bay in winter, bringing supplies of provisions and money, and purchasing herrings from the people. The civil war, in its mischievous influence on the commerce of the States, has for the present, almost, if not entirely, put an end to the traffic with our western people, and we already see the injurious consequences in the increased pauperism of which the Government are warned they will have to encounter.

"We have had stupid and fanatic partisans ever since the accomplishment of the measure of Free Trade with the States, querulously inquiring, from time to time, what good has it done, and to these people we would just now suggest, that they should visit Placentia and Fortune Bays, and go amongst the people, and in the starvation they will witness, owing to the want of the American customers for herrings, they may find at least a partial answer to their interrogatory-" What good has the Reciprocity Treaty conferred on the country ?"

The election contest at Placentia and Saint Mary's has resulted in the return of Pierce M. Barrow, Esq., the Government candidate.
