To His Excellency, Hon. ARTHUR HAMILTON Brunswick, in Council :

The petition of the undersigned merchants and others, inhabitants of the City and County of St. John.

Respectfully sheweth,-That it is of great importance to the interests of the Province generally, to foster the trade, and extend the communication opened the past season, between this City and the ports of the North-Eastern coast of New Brunswick. That so using, trade would be promoted, the Revenues increased, Domestic Manufactures increased, and the receipts from the line of Italiway between St. John and Suediac greatly enlarged. That to secure such advant.ges, your Petitioners are of opinion a first class steam vescel, combining suitable draught of water, a high rate of speed, and sufficient accommodation for passengers and freight, should, on the opening of uavigation, be eng ged to connect with the line of Rail way at Suediac, the ports of Richibucto, Miramighi, Bathurst and Dalhousie, by weekly communication.

That judging from experience of the past year, your l'etitioners are of opinion, during the present and perhaps for a year or two to come, there will not be sufficient traffic in passengers and freight to induce parties to pu a Boat on the proposed route without Govern-

That in view of the advantages to be derived by the establishment of such a line, in order to insure regular, safe, and speedy con munication between the ports named, your Petitioners would respectfully recommend the payment of such reasonable amount from the Provincial Chest, as ought to command the services of a suitable steam vessel for this purpose. That in consideration of such aid, an arrangement should be made with the Proprietor of the steam vessel receiving it, defining the number of trips to be run, the time of departure and return from and to the respective ports, and a Tariff of charges for Passengers and Freight Your Petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency in Council will take the subject mpiter of their Petition, into favorable conaderation, and make such arrangements as will insure the attainment of the objects referred to.

And your Petitioners will ever pray.

An Elective Legislative Council.

At the last Session of the Legislature of P. E. Island, an Act was passed-"to change the constitution of the Legislative Council by rendering the same elective."

An Act of so much importance would, of course, need the Royal assent before coming into effect, and it was accordingly transmitted to the Colonial Office. The Duke of Newcastle, in a despatch dated Feb. 4th, has stated the objections to which it is liable, and the changes wh ch must be made, before it can obtain Her Majesty's sanction.

His Grace does not think it at all objectionable, that the Legislative Council should be incapable of being dissolved by the Governor, but rather the contrary. He considers an Upper Chamber valuable as an element of stability, and that in virtue of its elective character, it might cl im, equalty with the Assembly, to speak the voice of the commi mity; yet it might be so composed as to reflect heir settled wishes, and principles, rather than

their transitory impulses. His Grace then proceeds to state some objections to the details of the Act in question, and declares he does not think it at all necessary that the present Legislative Councillors should be allowed to retain their places in the newly constituted body. In calling those Councillors to the places they now occupy, the Crown did not coufer upon them "a property," but invested them with "a trust," which the Assembly may properly call upon them to

transfer to other hands, if that body deems the public interest to require such transfer. The Duke then lays down certain general

principles, as follows :-In a popular Assembly, the numbers and the practical energy and the immediate desires of the community, find a ready expression. But an Upper Chamber is generally intended to represent, not only the settled principles, and what, on a large scale is called the traditionary policy of the Country, and also to a certain extent, its property, experience, and education. With this view, the British Colonies are utanimous in requiring, that an elective Councillor shall be 30 years of age, and

nia, a tolerably high qualification is required from electors, but none whatever from the

"By the Prince Edward Island Act, on the contrary, (copying that of Canada) the electors qualification is the same as that for the Assembly. But the qualification of a Candidate is one which will materially limit the choice of the Constituencies.

"He must have resided in the Colony for five years—he must possess six hundred pounds (£600) worth of land, and (what is most unduly re-trictive) his residence, or his property qualification, must be within the District for which he is elected.

"Moreover, he will lose his seat if he lose his property qualification—that is, if he exchanges his farm from one Electoral District to another.

"I entertain a strong opinion, that these provisions are most injudicious, and that in order to make a Council what it ought to be, the property qualification should be applied, not to the Candidate, but to the Voter.

"Speaking broadly, a well chosen constituency will choose a good representative; and any limitations upon its choice, can only operare by occasionally preventing them from choosing the best. An ill chosen constituency, on the contrary, will tend to choose an indifferent representative; but this tendency will not be controlled by any property qualification, which can never be so stringent as to prevent their finding, within the prescribed limits, some such man as they may desire.

"And in the same way, if it is desired that the two Chambers shall somewhat differ in character from each other-the one supplying what the other may be supposed in some degree to want-this object, it appears to me, can only be effected by creating two, somewhat d fferent consultuencies, and unreserved!y trusting each of them to elect that person whatever his property or station, whom they may deem the most able and trustworthy representative of their views.


