#### More Growling at England.

Our "American cousins" are especially angry with H. M. Government, and John Bull gene rally, for not allowing the " Tuscarora" to go to sea until 24 hours after the departure of the Confederate Steamer "Nashville," in conformity with the usages of all civilized nations. nation manifested by Mr. Adams, at the treatment to which the United States is subjected in the British ports. The detention of the "Tuscarora," under the guns of the English frigate, to prevent her pursuit of the "Nashville," harbor ed in port by the British government, may well excite the indignation of our whole people. We could almost wish that the "Tuscarora" had slipped her cables, and yielded only to actual superior force, after being fired upon. Great Britain would not thus act. if she did not improvidently conceive that we were weak in our present struggle, and thus might be insulted with impunity ; nor will she do so again, after learning the news which will shortly reach her shores.

We have not been among those predisposed harshly to prejudge the sentiments of Great Britain towards us. We supposed her selfish enough, but still restrained by certain principles of rectitude and good conscience. But there is no reasonable excuse for her conduct in regard to the "Nashville" and "Tuscarora.' She should not have prevented the latter from sail ing after a craft, which has only the shadowy claim to be a legalized privateer, according to belligerent doctrines which England was so forward to apply to this contest. But every principle of justice, of comity, of humanity even. should have prompted her to abstain from forcible interference, so as to prevent the capture of a most misch evous rover of the seas .- which only on the most dubious grounds could be held the privileged war-ship of a belligerent "power." The conduct of England in this respect is a gross insult and outrage, deserving resentment and deserving remembrance; and we sincerely wish that Mr. Adams might be called home, and that all but the most formal and indispensable diplomatic intercourse with her might be broken off.' All the above swagger amounts to this-that England shall have no jurisdiction in her own waters, and shall not be allowed to enforce the aws of nations, because Brother Jonathan does not see fit to be restrained in any way !

We refrain making any comments on the admitted carclessness which has caused this first serious accident on our Railway.

The following rule was in the hands of the conductor of the wood train, and attention to it would have prevented this sad catastrophe :

" Engine Driver's must not pass switches until they themselves perceive them to be right. When not seen by them, they are to assume that they are wrong. In failure, and the pageant of his inauguration a following an Engine or Train, they must approach all Stations, and enter all curves upon the supposition that the preceding Train is delayed. THIS MUST NOT BE NEGLECTED."



The Morning Chronicle, of the 20th, says of the Legislature :---

A week has elapsed, without any other feeling having been manifested than one of comparative courtesy, and an apparent wish on both sides to forward the public business. A Bill has been introduced in the Legislative Council by the Solicitor General, for the incorporation of Joint Stock Companies, the principal object of which is, to facilitate the formation of Companies for gold mining, as under the proposed Bill, Companies can be formed at once, without an application to the Legislature.

The Bill provides that when four or more persons desire to be incorporated as a Joint Stock Company, they may procure a Charter under the Great Seal of Nova Scotia, upon filing in the office of the Provincial Secretary a declaration setting forth the names and places of residence of the parties desirous of being incorporated, the name of the Company, the object of the same, and the business in which it proposes to engage, with details as to capital, number and nized, it is remarkable that for this large class value of shares, amount of real estate they wish to hold and all other particulars. When those no public provision of any kind has been made. and other requirements are complied with, the Governor and Conncil may issue a fiat for the incorporation of the Company by Charter .--but no Charter shall be granted, in this way, for insurance or banking purposes.


