

expedients have been resorted to, to secure a supply of it. It has been selling freely at \$1.25 per pound in Richmond. It is now stated that an immense bed of rock salt, affording a plentiful and inexhaustible supply, has been discovered at Opelika, in Alabama.

The Legislature of the State of South Carolina is in session. The Governor in his message urges the support of the Confederate authorities in a measure for common defence. He forbears, in view of the crisis, to object to the conscript law, though viewing such acts as against the spirit of the Constitution. He alludes to President Lincoln's emancipation proclamation, and recommends the formation of a State guard of citizens under 18 and over 45 years of age, for police duty. He says that the State has furnished 42,000 Confederate troops, besides eight regiments for coast defence. He urges the prompt organization of negro laborers, so that the fortifications around Charleston harbor may be made permanent.

Mobile is to be defended to the last extremity, and the Federals may burn its edifices, but they shall never occupy its soil in peace.

Great preparation is being made for the defence of the coast of North Carolina.

The Raleigh (N. C.) Progress, of Nov. 27, says Major-Gen. G. W. Smith is in Petersburg, and in command of a force sufficient to protect the approach to Richmond in that direction.

The Richmond Examiner, of Nov. 29, says, the next session of the Confederate Congress commences at Richmond in the second Monday in January.

The Richmond Whig will hear of no terms of peace from any party in the North until a stop is put to the war. It says, with reference to a peace proposal of Senator Bigler of Pennsylvania:

"We are forced to conclude that he advises the North to abandon the war and let the South alone. Nothing less than this would be practical or have the appearance of being in earnest. With this appreciation of the merits of the controversy, and his knowledge of southern character, he can have no doubt that so long as the North continues to make war the South will continue to make resistance, and there can, consequently, be no peace. The first step toward pacification can come only from the North, and it must be a suspension of hostilities; and the pacification can then be completed only by making the suspension permanent. This is inevitable from the character of the war itself; they invade, we resist; they assail, we defend; they seek to subjugate, we to maintain our liberty. They must cease to invade, to assail, and to attempt to subjugate, for we cannot cease to resist and defend without ruin. All this must be plain to Mr. Bigler; and when he talks about peace, he will talk idly and insincerely unless he calls on the North to stop making war on the South."

DOMESTIC.

The Bazaar in aid of the newly-organized Volunteer Companies in this City opens to-day in Smith's building. The object is a good one, and we hope our citizens will patronize it.

St. Paul's Church, Portland, of which the Rev. W. H. Devere is Rector, has contributed \$158 to the Relief Fund. It is a very liberal donation from this small Parish. The Baptist Church in Germantown has contributed \$41, and the Baptist Church in Brussels street \$51.28 towards the same fund.

Thursday last was observed as a day of thanksgiving in Canada and Nova Scotia.

The Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island has been made elective. The concurrence of Her Majesty to the act was only communicated when the two Houses had assembled "for the despatch of business," and, of course, there was an end of the session. A new election will take place immediately.

The "Vanderbilt" and the "Acotah"—two vessels of war which were despatched from New York to capture or sink the "Alabama"—have returned to port. They did not succeed either in finding, or even in hearing of, the Confederate cruiser. The Secretary at War has promised the New York merchants to make another attempt.
