But whatever advantages their governmental form confers, we already possess them, or can easily secure them by wiser methods than

a democratic republic employs. Moreover, in some important points, their form of government, and especially their modes of administration, present examples to warn, rather than models to imitate.

Wherever they have departed very widely from the British Constitution, they are little worthy of our respect. The unmistakable deteri ration in the practicable working of their government is as evident as it is lumentable. Party government, as found among our neighbours, is an organized combination for the purpose of public plunder, and brings to the helm of affairs, with some honorable exceptions, contemptible medicarities, unprin-cipled adventurers, and blatant demagogues. Their whole system of caucuses, party conventions and nominations, is pre-eminently calculated to debase the public sentiment.—In the judgment of the wisest European publicists, their system of government will prove

work assigned to it, as the difficult social prob-lems of the Old World, transferred to the New, shall come up for solution. On the other hand, it is manifest that the British a iministration has been steadily growing more genial and liberal in spirit—more lotty in the tone of the chief public men to whom it is entrusted. The British statesmen of the present day will compare favourably with those of any previous period.

VIOLATION OF THE QUEEN'S PRO-CLAMATION.

(From Halifax Papers received last night.)

The R. M. S. Merlin arrived on Saturday last from Burmuda. We are indebt-ed to A. Forsyth, Esq., for a file of papers from thence.

Capt. Sampson reports that whilst entering the harbor or St. George, on Monday last, from St. Tuomas, his vessel was brought to by a blank shot from a Federal gunboat cruising off the harbor. It after-wards turned out that this vessel was the Sonoma, belonging to the fleet of Admiral Wilkes, which had been in the harbor for some days, and which had just left.

The following is a letter from the Bermuda correspondent of the Acadian Recorder, written immediately previous to the departure of the Merlin :

"We have been sadly insulted by three ships of the Federal navy, under command of the notorious Wilkes. These ships arafter being presented with a copy of the Queen's proclamation relative to the twen-ty-four hours limit, entered the port of St. George for coal, with the understanding that she was to leave at the latest on Monday morning. Monday came—the diver represented that the Admiral ship required some repairs to her boulom, but no re-

pairs were attempted.
On Tuesday the ships were still in port. Our Governor and the Commandant of the Troops went on board to expostulate with Admiral Wilkes, and he promised to leave on Wednesday. Wednesday came—still the vessels were in the limited waters of the port, and no sympon the limited waters of the port, and no symptom of their intention was exhibited to move. On Thursday morning, however, the Admiral and the gunboat he brought in with him, and the one that was blockading the port was moved in to take coal and undergo

"Admirat Wilkes was induced to leave at length, it seems, by a communication from the Governor, telling him that if he did not he would compel him. After he got to sea he wrote a very offensive letter to the Governor, accusing him of many things—things, indeed, as such men only as Wilkes could and were guilty of in the port of St. George. It would seem that Wilkes had a double object in coming to Bermuda—first, to insult the authorities for he must have known in what a deties, for he must have known in what a de ties, for he must have known in what a defenceless state we were in, and secondly to capture or destroy the vessels in that port—six s'eamers—that are engaged either directly or indirectly in the trade with the Confederate ports, and to destroy the powder, of which there is said to be a large quantity stored on one of the small Islands in Castle harbor. The Admiral and one of his steamers had gone out of sight from the land, but the other one, having coaled and repaired is cruiting desired. having coaled and repaired, is cruising outside of St. George.

Our present financial condition is by no means flattering, and will require the most careful and

flattering, and will require the most careful and prudent management in order to meet local requirements and preserve public faith.

The proposed enterprise, if accomplished, must largely increase taxation, which, in my estimation, the people are unable and unwilling to bear. The present tariff is as high as circumstances will warrant. My views on this subject may be erroneous, but I have given it the most careful and deliberate consideration, with a full appreciation of its magnitude and the importance of the step I am about to take. Under these circumstances, I feel myself constrained by a sense of public duty, to separate from my colleagues and retire from the Government, and now beg to tender to your Excellency my resignation of the office of Attorney General as well as my seat in the Executive Council.
