India FROM THE UNITED STATES.

A great Democratic State Convention came off in Columbus: Ohio, on the 11th inst. It is said that some 50,000 people were present. Valandigham who had been arrested and banished by the Lincoln administration upon the charge of treason, was unanimously nominated for Governor of the State. and Pugh, a gentleman of the same school, was nominated for Lieutenant Governor. The business of the Convention proceeded amid the greatest e athusiasm over known in Ohio, and a platform for future action was submitted and passed. A series of resolutions, 23 in and easily adjusted Fixture in use. For sale low at No. 11 number, were cordially adopted, denouncing the policy of the Lincoln administration, in no measured terms, on the emancipation question, for subverting the civil law by military enactments and for suspending the writ of habeas corpus. This probably was the most outspoken meeting of the Democratic party that has occurred since the breaking out of the war. It is designed to bear upon the next Presidential campaign, and is sadly ominous of the want of harmony in the counsels of the North.

Angrouffic SEAT OF WAR.

FROM THE RAPPAHANNOCK .- The news is startling. It is believed that General Lee has resolved to take the offensive and invade Maryland, Western Virginia or Pensylvania. The Herald's despatch from the Headquarters of the Army, dated 13th, says affairs remain unchanged. The enemy has a large force in the vicinity of Fre-dericksburg, but make no demonstrations except picket firing and occasional artillery shots. Longstreet's and Elwell's corps are near Culpepper, preparing for a movement on our right. Firing was heard in the direction of United States Ford this morning. Another despatch dated " Third Army Corps, June 15th." says the movements of Lee in the direction of Culpepper have been on a larger scale than was st first supposed, embracing all his army, except about 10,000, which remain opposite Falmouth. No doubt Lee intends to risk everything on a determined effort to cross the Rappahannock and assume the offensive. The Harper's Ferry correspondent of the Herald states that it is reported by our cavalry that a rebel force of infantry and artillery passed through Sperry-ville on Tuesday last, the column occupying three and a half hours in moving. It is thought the rebels intend moving into Western Virginia, where they will make a destructive and bold raid, as we are not prepared in that quarter. On Thursday a battalion of Vermont cavalry had a brisk fight with rebel cavalry at Edwards's Ferry, and drove them back across the river, where they had heavy infantry support. TYAL 0231 20 To meet this anticipated invasion, the President calls for 100,000 militia for six months-10,000 from Maryland ; 50,000 from Pennsylvania ; 30,000 from Inporter of British and Foreign Dry . Bidd VICKSBURG AND PORT HUDSON are still as defiant as ever. All attempts to take these strongholds have as yet failed. The sacrifice of life to the assailing forceshas been immense. The plan is now to compel surrender by starvation. Successful raids have been made along the Mississippi by Federal Cavalry, and large amounts of property of all kinds destroyed. This is done, for the purpose of cutting off the supplies of the rebels. Humanly speaking, it seems impossible that the defenders of Vicksburg and Hudson can much longer withstand the power that is arrayed against them. what's do not On Tuesday evening a telegram informs us that an exchanged officer from Richmond reports that the trains brought two or three thousand troops daily for six weeks, and says that Stewart's cavalry and mounted artillery number thirty thousan Washington Republican says Lee's whole army is in Shenandonh Valley, having left Fredericksburg entirely. entirely. Business in Philadelphia suspended. Harrisburg reports state that the enemy is at Car-lisle, only eighteen miles distant.
