The loss on the Confederate side was also very great, so that we may estimate the number of killed and wounded in this prolonged engagement at near twenty thousand men! gunboats, is attacking Vicksburg. Four several assaults have been repulsed with great loss, but the alone for the year just closed, shows an increase of The Confederate General Bragg reports to Rich-

mond that he has gained a great success over the Federals, capturing 4000 prisoners, 31 pieces, of artillery, and 200 waggons: Bragg's command was in Tennessee, and it is not easy to reconcile this re-General in the same quarter.

A Boston paper states that the Confederaces lost. in the various battles fought last year, in killed, wounded and prisoners, 108,707 men, and the Federals 132,819. These figures are truly terrible, but they give but a faint idea of the distress and suffering caused by this unnatural war.

It is stated that at Washington the opinion is calning ground that the South cannot be conquered, and that negotiations for peace should be opened. The New York Tribune boldly "Is there no possibility of peace," and then answers. "Yes, certainly, but let those who began the war make the first overtures for it." The Tribune thinks the fairest way to settle the difficulty is by arbitration, and indicates Switzerland as the power to whom the question might be referred. od?

Saturday: — The Imperial Government have signified their wil-The Imperial Government have signified their willingness to ask Parliament to sauction the guarantee of a loan of £3,000,000, the sum of money for which it is supposed the road can be built. The money will be raised by the Lords Commissioners of the Imperial Treasury, who will issue and effect the negotiation of debentures. In this way it is calculated that the funds will be obtained at 3½ per cent.—one half per cent. less than we had reckoned upon; and besides, the Provinces will be relieved from the payment of all charges for commissions to agents and others, except that part of the loan should be arranged for through the Bank of England, and then the charge will only be a per cent. By this mode of procedure a considerable sum will be saved to the Provinces, which, even in the most prosperous times, is an object. According to the original estimate, the to discontinue. amount required for interest was £120,000, but this new arrangement will effect a reduction of about £15,000. The arrangement entered into at Quebec by the Delegates from the three Provincial Government, and approved by the Imperial Government, by which Canada agreed to bear five-twelfths, and Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick seven-twelfths of the responsibility, will make the amount for which each of them becomes liable assuming the cost of amount required for interest was £120,000, but this Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick seven-twelfths of the responsibility, will make the amount for which each of them becomes liable, assuming the cost of the road to be no more than £3,000,000, as follows: Canada, £1,250,000; Nova Scotia, £875,000; and New Brunswick, 875,000. On these sums the interest is to be paid semi-annually to the Imperial Treasury. As regards the principal, the mode of repayment is thus £xed: £250,000 in ten years; £500,000 in twenty years; £1,000,000 in thirty years, and £1,250,000 in forty years. Into the Sinking Fund to be established in order that ample provision may be made for the payment of the principal, the Imperial Government do not require that anything should be paid until after the expiration of ten years from the time that the loan is effected. Objections were very reasonably raised by the delegates to the Sinking Fund, on the ground that it would necessitate the investment of the money in consols, which would realize but a very low rate. The Chancellor of the Imperial Exchequer, acknowledging the reasonable ness of these objections, and willing to remove anything that had at all the appearance of a stumbling-block, consented that the Provinces should have the privilege of investing the money in their own securities, or in any other securities upon which the parties interested might mutually agree.
