The early disappearance of two corps commanders from the field also made a demoralizing impression. The loyal people certainly have cause for self-congratulation that the Army of the Cumberland was not completely destroyed, and owes profound grati-tude to Gen. Thomas and those under him that saved it. Our losses are great. That in killed, wounded and missing will probably reach ten thousand. Of artillery, we are less some fifty pieces, mostly lost on Sunday. Of wagons, loaded with ammunition and supplies, ambulances, &c., we have also lost a great number. They were abandoned in the retreat on WENTER PER LOS Sunday.

General Bragg's account of the battle is as follows : Ten Miles South of Chattanooga, Via Ringgold, Sept. 21.

To Gen. Cooper The enemy retreated on Chattanooga last night. leaving his dead and wounded in our hands. His loss is very large in men, artillery, small arms and colors. Ours is heavy, but not yet ascertained. The victory is complete, and our cavalry are pursuing. With the blessing of God, our troops have accomplished great results against largely superior numbers. We have to mourn the loss of many gallant men and officers. Brig. Gens. Preston, Smith, Helm, and Deshler are killed; Major-Gen. Hood, and Brig.-Gens. Adams, Gregg and Brown, wounded.

BRAXTON BRAGG. (Signed) Governor Harris, of Tennessee, also sends the fol-

lowing dispatch :--BATTLEFIELD, CHICKAMAUGA, Sept. 21-11 A. M.

The enemy retreated from our front under cover last night, leaving his killed and wounded on the field. Our victory is complete. We have captured a large number of small arms. Thirty-six pieces of artillery has been brought in. Twenty additional pieces reported to have been taken. About 5,000 prisoners reported captured. Our army is in tine spirits, ready and eager for vigorous pursuit. No additional particulars to report. We met here the whole force of Rosecran's army.

ISHAM C. HARRIS. NEW YORK, Sept. 26 .- The Post's Washington dis-

patch says: It is currently said here, and such in fact is the purport of the information that we receive from various sources, that the reinforcements sent off to the help of Bragg against Gen. Rosecrans have left Richmond almost defenceless. There is but a handful of troops left for the security of the rebel capital.

The late battle of Uhatanooga would have had a different result if the orders of the Government had been more punctually obeyed. The Gov-ernment was aware of the design of the rebels in reinforcing Bragg, viz: to overwhelm our army by superior numbers, and sent a message by telegraph to General Burnside, ordering him to reinforce Rosecrans with the forces under his command. Gen. Burnside replied that he was on his way to Jonesboro', and would join Rosecrans as soon as he had occupied that place. The Government then repeated the order in a peremptory manner, ordering him to reinforce Rosecrans immediately. Two days afterward a telegraphic message was received here from Gen. Burnside to the effect' that he had taken Jonesboro', and should now proceed to the assistance of Rosecrans. At the latest advices the main body of the troops under Burnside were at Athens. His advance was at Cleveland. The Government is not satisfied with this proceeding of Gen. Burnside, and it is yet to be seen what necessity there was for his neglect to obey the order given him in such express terms.", FOTEBRIE & JAARSHON

TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACCIDENT-FIVE KILLED AND TWENTY TWO WOUNDED. - Chicago, Ill., Sept. 26. -At 6.30 P. M., yesterday, a special train consisting of a locomotive and twenty cars left Kalamazoo, bound West; while coming down the four-mile grade be-tween Mattawan and Lawton, some drunken rowdies near the rear end of the train cut the bell rope and pulled out a link between the cars, thus dividing the train. Being upon the down grade, the engineer did not discover the loss of a portion of the train, and did not stop until he reached Lawton. Within two minutes the rear portion of the train came thunder-ing down the grade. The engineer, in endeavoring to get away with his portion of the train safely, put on steam with such force as to break the coupling be-ween the engine and the cars. A collision immediately ensued between the two portions of the train, and five persons were killed and 22 wounded. Some of the latter are so seriously injured that their recov-ery is impossible.
