guns. The shore batteries continued firing all the afternoon and night on the walls of Sumter with good effect. This morning is cool and clear, and the batteries are steadily at work. The Weehawken and Passaic are keeping the batteries of Wagner, and Gregg silent, and up to noon, when the Arkansas sailed, the remainder of the fleet are lying at the moorings. The bodies of Capt. Rodgers and Paymaster Woodbury have been embalmed and go North in the Arkansas. General Gillmore announces that the work thus far has been entirely satisfactory, that the fort is greatly damaged and the work progressing finely. Admiral Dahlgren is much depressed by the loss of Fleet Captain Rodgers, but is highly gratified with the operations of the fleet and army, and very hopeful of ultimate success. Up to the moment of sailing, at noon, the seige guns since morning have been hurling about five shells per minute at Sumter with marked effect. Two monitors, the Ironsides and some gunboats are shelling batteries Wagner and Gregg.

THIBD DISPATCH. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28-The Arkansas left the fleet at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. At that time huge volumes of smoke were seen issuing from Fort Sumter, as if from the burning of cotton, and the officers of the Arkansas believed that the fort would be captured or entirely destroyed by noon. Her guns were replying feebly to our fire. Fort Gregg had been entirely silenced. Wagner still held out. The bombardment continued without cessation during Tuesday night, and was renewed Wednesday morning, and when the Arkansus left the firing was furious. The Ironsides, five monitors and the shore batteries being all engaged.

The Washington Star of the 25th, in commenting upon the telegrams from Charleston contained in the Richmond papers, says:—"Sumter being subdued, the lion's share of the work of reducing the other harbor fortifications and of removing the recel channel obstructions falls upon the iron-clads, as the army cannot probably get another so available foothold as they have attained on Morris Island. We should, therefore, not look for the fall of Charleston to follow immediately upon that of Sumter, as the task of advancing will now present a new class of difficulties to be studied and overcome; but that they will be overcome there is not the slightest doubt, and that rebels think so too is evident from the order issued by Governor Bonham for non-combatants to leave

MOVEMENT OF THE POTOMAC ARMY. - The New York Post publishes the following, from a letter dated near Kelly's Ford, Va., Aug. 16:

Again the Army of the Potomac seems to be on the move. For some days back the several corps encamped on the Rappahannock have been under marching orders and during that time portione of each have been on the move. Portions of the 11th, 2d, 5th, 1st, &c., have moved off by rail from Bealton Station toward Alexandria. This station is south of Warrenton Junction seven miles, and on the Orange and Alexandria Railroad. Cars went down this morning to the Rappahannock Station, distant south of Bealton Station, on the same road, four miles, to convey troops from there up—no doubt to Alexandria—at all events in that direction. A portion of the 1st division, 12th corps, left this morning for Bealton Station, and also a portion of the 2d division, same corps, to take the cars there. The troops are being moved off from each corps in their turn.

But one brigade of the First Division, Twelfth Corps,

is now at this ford. It is under marching orders, and will, no doubt, leave this evening or to-morrow morning. The pontoon bridge at Kelly's Ford was taken up day before yesterday, and sent by rail to Alexandria. Our cavalry were withdrawn, and but little lookout is kept in our front. It seems as though the enemy has left us. Deserters come in daily. One taken yesterday stated that Lee's army was in Richmond. This movement of the troops has come on us suddenly and unexpectedly. Portions of the troops which have gone from this, after reaching Alexandria, have been sent to North Carolina. It would seem by the troops going from this by rail that their destination at first is Alexandria.

Bealton Station is a lively place just now. Long trains of cars can be seen moving off every few hours, loaded with troops, including artillery. &c. The weather is very warm. Four thousand troops are to leave Belton Station to-day." The Federal armies in the West, under the com

mand respectively of General Rosecrans and General Burnside have moved forward—the one in the direction of Chattanooga and the other of Knoxville. Stirring news is anticipated from East Tennessee in a few

An'attack upon Mobile is threatened, and the Confederates are busily engaged in strengthening its defences. General Joe Johnston is in command

The yellow fever has broken out at New Orleans

The Federal soldiers at Vicksburg and Port Hudson are suffering from typhoid fever of a most malignant type, seven out of ten cases proving fatal.

A correspondent of the New York Times, writing from New Orleans on the 10th inst., says! "Last week Gen. Andrews, with his command, went a short distance to the rear of Port Hudson, to drive off some marauding parties of rebels. He succeeded in getting into an ambuscade, and before he

could extricate himself lost two pieces of artillery and about 150 killed and missing. The balance of his force succeeded in getting back into town. The health of the troops at Port Hudson is very bad over fifty per cent, of some regiments being sick with ague and fever." The draft has been completed in New York without any further disturbance of the peace. It appears

that the amount of the damage in consequence of the riots, which have thus far been presented to the authorities of New York, amount to \$1,305,740,29. The subscriptions to the fund in aid of colored people who suffered by the rioters, amount to \$38,696. Several of the rioters were tried and sentenced before Recorder Hoffman. All who were arraigned were convicted with one exception, and received awards of imprisonment varying in duration from ten months
