ed to fall back. Our people pressed them close, allowing no space to be created between the attacked and attacker, and finally drove them into and then out of the celebrated six gun battery that did such terrible execution upon the steamer Mississippi the

night she was destroyed. Here was a great point gained—a point that we could use to advantage against the other works of the enemy. And it did not take long for the quick eye of Weitzel to see all this and profit by it. As soon as practicable the guns were shifted and put to work. and were busy at last accounts in throwing shot and shell into and against the position of their late owners. This was decidedly the most brilliant and successful part of the day's work; not that the men fought any better, or showed more determination than those on other parts of the field, but it was the greatest point gained, and proved what we could do when resolved to accomplish certain ends. By this operation the enemy's left was turned, and in a manner to prevent the lost ground being recovered. The battery captured was the most annoying of any of the line, for it raked completely the channel-way of the river.

SHERMAN'S ATTACK ON THE ENEMY'S RIGHT. No more desperate fighting has ever taken place than of the division of General Sherman in the attack upon the right of the enemy's position. Our men faced the storm of iron and lead that was hurled against them as if it had always been their business to do so. They moved steadily forward under the most murderous fire of shot, shell, grape, canister and musketry, with a steadiness that was surprising.

The 2d regiment Louisiana Native Guard, Colo Neilson, were in the charge upon the enemy's works; they went on in the advance, and when they came out six out of nine hundred could not be accounted far. It is said on every side that they fought with the desperation of tigers. One negro was observed with a rebel soldier in his grasp, tearing the flesh from his face with his teeth, other weapons having failed him. There are other incidents connected with the conduct of this regiment that have raised them very much in my opinion as soldiers. After firing one volley they did not deign to load again, but went in with bayonets, and wherever they had a chance it

was all up with the rebels. Although we gained much ground, and hold it, still the principal object of this attack was not accomplished, namely, getting possession of and holding the batteries on the enemy's right. It was owing to some misunderstanding. The charge cost us heavily in killed and wounded. Gen. Sherman led the attack in person, and fell severely wounded in the leg. General Neal Dow was also wounded. Colone Clarke of the Sixth Michigan, was killed Col. Clowes of the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth New York, also, by a bayonet thrust. Lieutenant-Colonel Smith of the Zouaves, severely wounded. The Sixth Michigan and the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth New York have each lost about half their effective men, and the other regiments have suffered severely. THE ATTACK BY AUGUR AND GROVER ON THE CENTRE.

The attack on the centre of the enemy's position by the columns of Generals Augur and Grover also exhibited the most terrible fighting and the same obstinate resistance. Our troops here, as well as on the right and left, did all that men could do, and held every inch of ground they gained. The enemy were driven foot by foot out of their rifle pits and intrenchments into their main works, from which they will never come out except as prisoners of war. From the Church Witness of Wednesday.

There are numerous reports of movements by General Lee, but nothing, so far, that can be relied upon. It was stated that he had withdrawn his forces from Fredericksburg, and General Hooker ordered the 2d Division of the Sixth army corps, under General Howe, to cross the Rappahannock about a mile below the city, to reconnoitre. The movement was made, but, finding the Confederates had not abandoned the position, the force returned to camp with the loss of thirty men.

New York. Last Wednesday one of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings ever convened in that city adopted an address and resolutions urging peace in the strongest manner, and denouncing the administration in the most violent fashion. The New York Herald says every allusion to peace was hailed with tremendous applause, and every time the name of General McClellan was mentioned a perfect storm of enthusiasm was occasioned. The mention of Mr. Vallandigham's name was also the signal for very decided approbation. The speeches were in time with the resolutions, exceedingly denunciatory of the administration, and in favor of a cessation of hostiliadministration, and in favor of a cessation of hostilities and the shedding of blood immediately, on any honorable terms. The principal orators were Attorney General Wootten, of Delaware; Fernando Wood, George Francis Train, Judge Flanders, Hon. Mr. Dinninny, Judge McCunn, and Mr. Wood, of Virginia.

General Bornside has commenced war against the SPRING press. He has forbidden the circulation of the New York World in his department, and he even issued an order to suppress the Chicago Times. The suppression of the Times, however, was one step too Selected by a buyer in the English Markets far, for the act created such an excitement in Chicago and all through the North-that Pesident Lincoln had to interfere and rescind the obnoxious edict. (Wednesday's Despatch.)

Bangor, June 10th. Murfreesboro advices report a rumor prevalent in the Confederate Camp of capitulation of Vicksburg, with 12,000 men. A later arrival confirms rumor.

Two spies of high position entering Federal lines, with pretended authority from Rosecrans, to inspect fortifications, was discovered and hung at Franklin. Further expedition up Yazoo river caused destruc-tion of nine Confederate transport steamers, valued at nearly million dollars.

Excepting a few steamers beyond Fort Pemberton, the Confederates possess no water transportation.
