sand bags between each embrasure on the parapet It was the clearest view of the Fortress I have yet had, and I examined it very carefully in all its parts. I had previously heard that the casemates were closed, and I have now no doubt of the fact, so far as the second tier are concerned. The lower tier was not visible from the point at which we lay, the view being from the shore of Morris Island across Fort Wagner, which concealed them. As to the upper tier they are undoubtedly most effectually closed, being filled out with masonry, making a smooth face of the wall. Deserters say that there is fifteen feet of solid sand bags closely packed inside of all the casemates, and that the parapet guns alone will be used in the coming conflict. The reason they give for this is that the walls were so thoroughly shattered by the April attack that they were in danger of falling from the concussion of the guns, and it was not deemed safe to use them any more. WHEN WILL THE ATTACK BE MADE?

This is a question asked here doubtless as often as it is at home, and as little is known here as at the North. Admiral Dahlgren is ready and General Gilmore is pushing forward his preparations with all possible energy. Both are anxious to commence possible energy. work as soon as all the necessary arrangements are made, and both are confident of entire success. Wagner and Sumter will both be attacked at one time, neither by assault any more, but both by regular siege operations. As to the time of the attack there is nothing but surmise, and this generally fixes the time between the 15th and 20th of August. SUCCESS CERTAIN.

Every day gives new confidence of success, and the time required to clear Morris Island and compel a surrender of Sumter is variously estimated at from two to six hours. Such expressions of doubt as to the result, as was the rule in April last, are heard no more. The Admiral is confident, the General is certain, and there are now no doubters in the fleet or on shore. Notwithstanding all this, Sumter is stronger for resistance now than it was then; the defences of Charleston have been increased, the fleet of iron-clads is no stronger, and the force of Gen. Gillmore not more numerous than that of Gen. Hunter.

Monday evening, Aug. 10-7 P. M .- The Cummings Point battery and one of Gen. Gillmore's batteries have been exchanging compliments all this afternoon, throwing up bodies of sand thirty feet high. The picket Monitors were up under the walls of Sumter last night, and exchanged a few shots in

FIRING AT SEA.-We learn from a slip from the Independent News Boom that the brig Hydra, from Glace Bay, Cape Breton, arrived at this port yesterday, reports as follows: A F. B.

"On the 9th August, wind north, light, clear weather, at 9 a. M., saw the smoke of a steamer bearing north and bound east. At 10 A. M. heard heavy and irregular cannonading in the northeast, which continued until 11.20 A. M., when it ceased. Our position at noon was Sambro Island, bearing north, distant twenty miles. The firing was too irregular for a salute and too rapid and promiscuous for target practice. Think it must have been an engagement between two vessels. Our distance from Halifax was thirty-seven miles, and the sound in a direction considerably to the eastward of that port."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 .- Information from the Army of the Potomac received to-night says there has been no change in the relative positions of the two armies so far as can be at present known, but there are some vague suspicions that the rebels are about to attempt a flank movement on our left.

A rumor has reached army, from the vicinity of Dumfries, that a large rebel force is approaching that place; but this is denied at headquarters. However it may be, we are ready to meet them in that quarter. New York, Aug. 16. The Jamaica Guardian of the 22d ult. says the captain of the barque Talisman reports that the United States steamer Vanderbilt has been captured by the priate Alabama, but gives no date or particulars.

Washington, Aug. 15.—During the past week the Board of Eurolment has had before them 476 cases, and of this number 296 have been exempted, 161 offered substitutes, which were accepted. Of the original drafted men, 18 were accepted, and 6 paid the \$300 commutation, thus out of 476 drafted men, 180 soldiers have been obtained.

More than half the young men who have been ex-mined as condidates for the Newport Naval Academy have been rejected, most of them on account of physical disabilities rather than a want of a sufficient

Gov. Seymour has written to Pres. Lincoln request ing the suspension of the draft for the present in New York State, and New York city especially, and the President has refused the request.

TORNADO AT CLEVELAND. - A violent tornado visited Cleveland, Obio, last Tuesday afternoon, unroofing houses, tearing up trees and overturning chimneys. The American House, the Johnson House, Waring Block, the Cleveland Woollen Mill and the Pittsburg Railroad depot were among the diffices which were rendered roofless.
