the State of Western Virginia, quite unmolested. This cannot last long. Every thing betokens severe

It appears that Ewell, the successor of Stonewall Jackson, has inherited no small measure of the energy and dash of the lamented General. Gen. Milrov. (Federal), as asserted by the Witness, was at Winchester, charged with the duty of watching the outlet of the Shenandoah Valley, so as to prevent the approach or ward off an attack from that quarter. He had about 15,000 men and a strongly fortified position at Winchester. He held also Martinsburgh and Berryville, the former an outpost of Harper's Ferry and the latter an outpost of Winchester. On Saturday, the 13th, while Milroy was quiety reposing, and probably thinking of the Confederates far away on the Rappahannock, his outpost at Berryville was fiercely attacked by General Ewell, who has succeeded to the command of the celebrated "Stonewall Jack son" division. General McReynolds held the place with 3000 men, and perceiving that he was outnumbered he retreated with all speed to Winchester, leaving his guns and stores a prey to the Confederates. General Ewell now pushed on after his retreating enemy and invested Winehester, which was strongly fortified expressly to meet and resist such an onset, It was surrounded with earthworks, had heavy guns planted and plenty of ammunition. The forces were pretty evenly matched; but in 24 hours Milroy was in full retreat upon Harper's Ferry. He left at midnight, but unhappily for him when he was 4 miles out on the Martinsburgh road, his retreating columns were met by an overwhelming force, through which he had to cut his way, arriving at last at Harper's Ferry, with the loss of 6000 stand of arms, three field batteries, 250 wagons, and at least 6000 men. But we will give the Federal account of this affair:

The outer works at Winchester were carried by the rebels by storm at 6 o'clock on Sunday evening, and the whole fortifications strongly invested by a force of not less than fifteen thousand men under Gen. Ewell. It became at once a question of ultimate surrender, or to make a bold dash to force their mate surrender, or to make a bold dash to force their way through the enemy's lines, and a counsel of war held on Sunday night, unanimously advised an evacuation. The large guns and his artillery were all spiked at once, and at one o'clock on Monday morning he abandoned everything except his horses, and struck boldly through the enemy's lines. The movement was so rapid that the enemy were taken by surprise, and the night being quite dark, the movement, so far as the troops immediately investing the works were concerned, was accomplished with but little loss.

little loss.

They were followed by cavalry, and a great many stragglers taken prisoners, but when four miles this side of Winchester, at the junction of the road leading from Berryville to Bunker Hill and Murtinsburgh, they were intercepted by a strong rebel force with artillery, and strongly posted in the woods on the roadside. Gen. Milroy rallied his men, and made several attemps to storm and capture their batteries, but was driven back.

Daylight was now rapidly approaching, and it was deemed prudent to endeavour again to cut their way through the enemy's lines, which was successfully accomplished, and being without artillery they suffered considerably, especially in prisoners captured, before the enemy gave up the pursuil.
