# ENGLISH AND CONTINENTAL.

It is reported that new difficulties have arisen between British and American Governments, owing to alleged seizures of British vessels too near Bahamas,

The English papers are discussing the new proposal of France for a settlement of the war in the neighboring States. The Shipping Gazette thinks that if it is rejected the Emperor has left himself apparently but one alternative; to recognize the South and raise the blockade. It anticipates the rejection of the proposal, and then adds :-

"Can England afford to let the French Emperor proceed alone in his American policy, or is he acting upon an understanding with Her Majesty's Government? These are questions of great importance, and we hope their solution is not far off."

The members for Liverpool-Messrs. Horsfall and Ewart, have addressed their constituents. The latter referred to the American war, and expressed the opinion that the time had arrived when the North should bow to the general feeling of Europe, and permit the South to go in peace.

The address of the French Senate to the Emperor approves his policy. It says, "In Mexico nothing remains but to advance. \*We rely entirely upon our heroic army." The address concludes with an expression of regret that the proposal of France for mediation in America has appeared premature to the other powers. A total to teach ow'l od

The Emperor's address to the French Exhibitors has the following passage, which seems to give great

I congratulate you upon your energy and perseverance in competing with a country which had out-stripped us in certain departments of labor. At last, then, that redoubtable invasion of British soil so long predicted has taken place. You have crossed the Channel; you have boldly established yourselves in the capital of England; you have courageously struggled with the veterans of industry. This campaign has not been without glory, and I am here today to give you the reward of the brave.

Royal Highness the Prince Consort, were duly laid at the foot of the Throne; and I am commanded to assure you that the Queen is deeply sensible of your L'Huys the satisfaction felt by the British Govern-The Moniteur says Lord Crowley has been inment on account of the late speech of the Emperor to the French Exhibitors at the World's Fair, and its strong desire to see the sentiment of mutual esteem daily strengthen the ties of friendship which unite the two nations, as well as their government.

> An insurrection has broken out in Poland, growing out of the enforcement of the conscription law. It was being rapidly suppressed at the last accounts.

The Viceroy of Egypt, who attracted so much attention while in England last summer, is dead. His death, we need hardly say, is deeply regretted, as he has ever proved a sincere friend to Great Britain. It is thought there will be little alteration in the foreigh policy of Egypt, but the address of the new Sovereign to the Consular body is a remarkable proof of the extension of enlightened views of government. The new Viceroy tells the Consuls that he is firmly resolved to devote to the prosperity of the country which he is called upon to govern all the perseverance and energy whereof he is capable." He promises "economy and order in the finances, as the base of all good administration," and not content with general good words, he adds, "and in order to give an example to all, as well as a proof of my firm ntention, I have resolved upon abandoning the sys tem of my predecessors, by fixing for myself a civil also to free trade, saying, "Due consideration shall also be paid to the system of free trade in Government measures, which will cause comfort to be diffused among all classes of the population."

"As regards moral questions, public instruction which is the basis of all progress, and a good admin-istration of justice, which is the basis of public security, will have all my solicitude; and from order in the finances and the public administration, and the good administration of justice, will result greater facility and security in the relations of Egypt with

These are remarkable sentiments as proceeding from the ruler of a great territory, once the seat of Eastern Empire, and of a people who may yet be raised to great consideration, when the day of which Isaiah prophesied shall arrive, and "Israel shall be the third with Egypt and with Assyria, even a blessing in the midst of the land: when the Lord of Hosts shall bless, saying, Blessed be Egypt my people, and Assyria the work of my hands, and Israel my inheritance."

## THE SEAT OF WAR.

The great Southern expedition designed for the capture of Charleston, under General Foster, arrived some days ago at Port Royal, South Carolina, Foster's army is said to be nearly as large as Grant's at Vicksburg, and including some of the finest regiments of the country. No labor has been deemed too great in the equipment of this strong force. The expedition comprises cavalry, artillery, infantry, transports, and gunboats, wooden and iron clad, and such an amount of improved projectiles for offensive warfrre, that victory has been organized, so far as it can be, by previous preparation.

A late letter from Newburn states that an importnt discovery was made there a few days since. About a mile and a half from the city, and beyond dense wood, it was ascertained, by accident, that the rebels had actually commenced the erection of earthworks with a view of shelling the place after the departure of the expedition for Charleston. Precautionary measures were at once taken to prevent the completion of the undertaking.

A joint proclamation was issued by Beauregard and Ingraham, on the 4th inst., to the effect that they had succeeded in raising the blockade at Charleston. This proves to be an exaggerated statement, It appears the steamer Princess Royal was captured by the Unadilla on the 29th, while attempting to run the blockade at Beach Inlet. The captain and pilot, however, escaped in a small boat, and gave such information to the rebels as induced the attack by the rebel rams, on the evening of the 1st inst., before daylight, with the hope of recapturing her. In this they failed entirely. The ram Palmetto State partially disabled the Mercedita, but the rebel command er was deceived as to her condition, and she subsequently steamed to Port Royal for repairs. An attack was then made upon the Keystone State, which was entirely disabled by a shot through her steamdrum. She was not captured, however, and was subsequently towed to Port Royal. Meantime the other ram-the Chicora-had attacked the Housatonic, but was driven off by her, and at 6.30 o'clock-still before daylight-both rams returned to Charleston, not having effected what they had in view. The Princess

and Hunter has not reached its final destination. It is said, indeed, that "it is at a stand still, and worse, even, for the troops are disembarking from the transports and taking up their quarters at St. Helena Island." The cause of this sudden halt is not known. One report says that the two generals have quarrelled: another, that the expedition is not strong enough for the point aimed at, and that General Foster is on his way to Washington to induce the Government to change its destination. The truth of these reports cannot, of course, be ascertained. It has, however, just been discovered by the Federals that "Charleston is a second Sebastopol. It is defended by over one thousand guns, many of them of improved European fabric. Every island, point, river, creek and swamp in proximity to Charleston is commanded by hostile manned. The Confederates have two rams and one iron cased battery, and 35,000 men in the garrison. In a word, Charleston is almost impregnable. General Banks finds also that Port Hudson is too

strong for his expedition; and we read now that it will require a month or six weeks before any serious impression can be made upon Vicksburg. The Confederates have captured the Sabine Pass

and its garrison, guns and supplies, with a Federal gunboat and a schooner in Government employ. The Federals are now driven from their last foothold on

The Confederate cruiser Florida has captured seven more prizes off Cuba. She put into Nassau for supplies and is now at sea again. The Alabama landed the crew of the Hatteras at Kingston, Jamaica.

The Illinois Legislature has adopted a series of re solutions favoring an early peace, by a vote of 53 to 28. A New York paper says there is but little doubt that the Legislatures of Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois, will meet in convention in March next through commissioners, and that Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York will be invited to co-operate.

The second attempt of the Emperor Napoleon to induce the Washington Government to enter into negotiations for peace, has proved fruitless.
