ENGLISH AND CONTINENTAL.

The Princess Louis of Hesse (Princess Alice, England), was safely delivered of a daughter on the 5th instant, at Windsor Castle.

It was reported that the chosen King of Greece, Prince William of Denmark, is destined to be the husband of Princess Louisa of England.

The annual review of the London Volunteers took place, as usual, on Easter Monday, at Brighton. About 20,000 men mustered on the ground, and the demonstration was a great success.

It is officially announced that the Princess of Wales will hold drawing rooms and levees, on behalf of the Queen, during May and June.

Mr. Gladstone, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, had been somewhat injured, and was confined to his house, owing to a fall from his horse.

The London Shipping Gazette remarks that the Washington Government could not take a more effectual means of drifting into a war with England than by the issue of privateering commissions to make reprisals upon British shipping for the successes of the Alabama ; but, in the face of precedents and the recorded opinions of former American Governments, it does not believe Mr. Lincoln and his colleagues will venture to incur the consequences of the threatened reprisals.

The Globe observes that every year the war in America is prolonged increases the danger of collisions with third parties, and the indisposition to make such reparation as neutral Powers must demand in case of infringement of neutral rights. In making such demands, the English Government will continue to act with all the forbearance and moderation consistent with the assertion of its rights.

The London Times' remarks, " the poor folly of styling the Confederate ships pirates has just been illustrated by a decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that a bond given by representatives of a captured Federal vessel and cargo to a Confederate officer for ransom, must be held valid in the Federal Courts-a decision which harmonises with a previous one in a case where the question arose whether the officers and crew of a rebel privateer were subject to the penalties of piracy. On that occasion the Court laid down that there could be no distinction between the rebels on the sea and the rebels on the land. If the latter were to be treated as prisoners of war, so should the former.

The insurrection in Poland is not crushed as was reported by the Russian authorities. The facts all tend to show that the fall of Langiewicz did not materially influence the movement. Indeed, they seem to support one of the pleas urged in defence of the sudden flight of Langiewicz, that he only abandoned one point with the intention of perplexing the Russian commanders by appearing, with increased strength, on another. It is asserted that his purposee was to raise the standard of revolt in the Government of Lublin. It may very well have been so, for that district is now in full insurrection without him, and under other chiefs. The Russian troops there have been surprised and defeated by a corps of peasants, and the whole face of the country is traversed by bands of insurgents. In fact, it is only since the 18th of March, when the revolt seemed for the moment crushed, that it has grown to formidable pro-

partions. It now extends through the whole breadth north and south. It encircles the seat and centre of the Russian Government, and extends along the frontier of Prussian Poland northward into Courland and the Polish portion of Livonia, thus reaching the coast of the Baltic and the shore of the Gulf of Riga.

NEW YORK, April 26. A Memphis dispatch of the 23d says that six more transports have recently been successful in running the blockade at Vicksburg. They are the Tigress, Empire City, Moderator, Anglo Saxon, Chessman and Harrison. Casualties not known. The Freestone and A. D. Ilines have taken two double-decked flatboats through the Duckport Canal. These boats are capable of carrying 1000 men each. The transports now run by Warrenton without difficulty, the batteries being silenced.

Gen. Banks' army is at Point Coupee, on the south bank of Red river, and opposite Bayou Sara.

The American Government has decided to surrender the Peterhoff. Admiral Wilkes is unfortunate in his seizure of British property.

A Paris journal publishes a despatch from Earl Russell to Lord Napier, instructing him to inform Prince Gortschakoff of the regret with which the sanguinary struggle in Poland is viewed by the British Government, and suggesting a return of the promises made to Poland in 1815, with general amnesty, as the sole remedy for the terrible evil. The journal in question next states that the Russian Minister made no official reply to this note, but that the tenor of his talk with Lord Napier was not of a nature to discourage those who hoped for spontaneous and coultable concesssions from the Czar.

La Nation asserts that France, England, and Aus tria had come to an understanding, and had sent separate notes to St. Petersburgh identical in sense. The notes avoid anything like pressure.

The nobility of St. Petersburgh had, in a meeting, unanimously voted an address to the Emperor, expressing their devotion to His Majesty, and the painful indignation at the pretensions put forward to Russian territory, and promising not to shrink before any sacrifice to preserve the integrity of the Empire.

THE SEAT OF WAR.

Telegrams to the Boston Journal furnishes the fol lowing intelligence :

The Era of the 19th inst., the only late paper re ceived, gives an account of the late military move-ments. On the night of the 17th inst., Gen. Banks had reached Vermilyonville after a hard fight at Ver-milyon Bayou, where the rebels had posted batteries

and infantry. They were driven after hard fighting, with considerable loss on both sides. A letter in the Era, dated on the field, above New beria, 17th inst., states that Col. Kimball with the 53d Massachusetts regiment, entered the rebel works at Bethel Place, on the morning of the 14th, planting our flag on the parapet. Gen. Weitzel's division fol-lowed, succeeded by the whole line. The rebels left their numerous dead unburied, and evidences were electry of bloady much in the statement of the stat plenty of bloody work in their ranks. Large stores of ammunition, some Enfield rifles and other arm were captured.

Our army then marched through Pattersonville, tirmishing continuously, and reached Franklin on the 15th.

At Franklin the steamboat Cornie was captured, with three officers of the late gunboat Diana on board, thus restoring them to our service. The re-bels destroyed ten steamboats and two large gunboats to prevent their falling into Gen. Banks' hands.
