It now devolved upon the Third New Hampshire regiment to push forward, and led by Gen. Strong and Col. Jackson in person, the gallant fellows dashed up against the fort. Three companies actually gained the ditch, and wading through the water found shelter against the embankment. Here was the critical point of the assault, and the Second brigade, which should have been up and ready to support their com-rades of the First, were unaccountably de ayed. Gen. Strong then gave the order to fall back, and lie down on the glacis, which was obeyed without confusion. It was while waiting here, exposed to the heavy fire, that Gen. Strong was wounded.* A fragment of shell entered his thigh, passing entirely through the fleshy part, and making a serious wound, although the bone escaped fracture. The breast of Col. Jackson's coat was torn off at the same time by a piece of shell, slightly wounding him. Neither of these brave men would lie down to escape the rain of metal, but stood unflinchingly throughhout, eliciting the unbounded admiration of their men. Finding that the supports did not come, Gen. Strong gave the order for his brigade to retire, and the men left the field in perfect order. A little while afterwards the other brigades came up, and made up for their apparent tardiness by glorious deeds of valor. Rushing impetuously up the glacis, undeterred by the fury of the enemy, whose glacis, undeterred by the fury of the enemy, whose fire was not intermitted for a second, several of the regiments succeeded in crossing the ditch, scaling the parapet and descending into the fort. Here a handto hand conflict ensued. About midnight the order was given to retire, and our men fell back to the rifle pits outside of our own works, having enaged in as hot y a con-tested battle as has ever teen fought. Our casualties as may reasonably be expected, were very large. The list of killed, wounded, and missing foots up fifteen hundred and thirty." Fort Wagner is a very large and very strong work. In its capacious bomb-proof apartments it can shelter thousands of men. It was reinforced just before the

Federal assault on the 18th. In that attack a portion of the Union troops made their way to the walls of the fort, but could not scale the enemy's defences, and were there subject to the most destructive fire, without a chance of retaliating upon their foes. The guns from Fort Sumter command much of Morris Island, the shell from the fort passing over the Federal batteries, and nearly to the rear of our position. The rebels may yet discover that the possession of Wagner is not a necessary preliminary to the reduc-tion of Sumter. Certain batteries on Morris Island, where rifled guns of four miles range have been mounted, will soon, if they have not already, open fire with similar results in regard to Sumter, that were produced at Fort Pulaski. A battery of these effective cannon, bearing upon Fort Sumter, is not nore than a mile and a half from this stronghold. When Fort Sumter is rendered powerless for mischief, Battery Bee, on Cummings' Point, will be speedily captured, and Fort Wagner falls as a matter of course. Notwithstanding the repulse of the 18th, the prospect of the ultimate reduction of the batteries protecting Charleston harbor is, therefore, good, and it is so considered by all the officers engaged in the present novement against the cradle of secession.

The news from Kentucky and Tennessee continues to be discouraging for the Confederates. Two bands of raiders, under the command respectively of General Morgan and General Scott, have been either captured or dispersed.

We do not believe he can induce any considerable European State to join him: and the moment he is convinced of this, he will probably take independent action. Louis Napoleon has put himself in such a position in regard to this continent, that he cannot very well avoid taking this step He has conquered Mexico and has under-taken the much more difficult task of establishing and maintaining a monarchical form of government, under a foreign Prince, upon the ruins of that Republic. Had not the love of lucre eaten like a gangrene into the very heart of the land, converting too many of us into worshippers of gain and rendering them unmindful of their duty to their country, to their fellow men, and to their God? Who, then, will presume to com-plain that we have been chastened, or to despair of our just cause and the protection of our Heavenly Father?
