Ship-building is emphatically the business of St John. When there are few ships in progress of erection, business is flat, when there are many it makes money easy, and infuses new life into every department of trade and commerce. Several of the building yards that have looked desolate for years, are now all activity and progress, and every section of the Province to some extent are benefited by the unexpected revival in this important department.

Among the many ships upon the stocks in the several yards is one of large dimensions, belonging to John Fisher, Esq. The News, of Friday last, thus speaks of this ship :-

"She will probably register about 1,150 tons. The length of her keel is about 170 feet, the breadth of beam 36 feet, and the depth of hold 24 feet. The kinds of wood used in her construction are chiefly tamarac and pitch pine. The lower deck beams and kelsons are, however, made of Southern oak. This vessel is being built under special survey of Lloyd's, to class 7 years. In order to render her fit for this grade, the usual stipulations in regard to the diagonal strapping, iron knees, and knee-riders are being com-plied with."

The Morning Telegraph, of Saturday, furnishes very flattering description of the Boot and Shoe Factory of D. H. Hall, Esq., of this city. Upwards of forty persons, of both sexes, are constantly employed by Mr. Hall, in one building, and some twenty others outside. Of these, eighteen are girls from sixteen to twenty years of age. THE REVENUE FOR 1862 .- Our readers will be grato learn that the Customs Revenue for the Port of Halifax alone, for the year just closed, shows an increase of \$210,800, as compared with 1861. And further, that the debt of \$136,689, incurred during the last session of the Legislature, payable by instal ments running over three years, was yesterday paid off in full by the Receiver General, leaving quite a snug balance besides, in the Bank, to the credit of the Province. In other words, that a debt payable in three years, has been liquidated in the short space of nine months .- Halifax Chronicle.

THE POOR OF HALIPAX .- It is anticipated that there will be a great amount of suffering among the poor of the city during the present winter.—Applications are daily made for admission into the Poors' Asylum, but no matter how deserving of charitable consideration the applicant may be, the authorities cannot find room for them, because the institution is already oc-cupied to its fullest capacity. There are no less than 380 inmates, being, as we are informed, about 50 more than were in the Asylum at this time last year.

GOLD NEWS .- The Pictou Standard informs us that the Mechanics' Gold Mining Company have taken 123 ounces of gold out of their claim at Isaac Harbour, up to the end of last month. This gold was obtained from 45 tons of quartz, thus shewing an average yield of a little less than 3 ounces per ton. The lead worked, is about 8 inches in thickness, and of pretty uniform quality.

The Chronicle, of Halifax, says that in a certain district in this Province (Nova Scotia), on New Year's day, a young lady of twenty years of age married her grandmother's uncle, and consequently her own great great uncle, aged sixty three. Ship-building is brisk in Digby County. No less than eight ships are in process of construction from Bear River to Meteghan.

We are glad to hear, says the Halifax Chronicle, that the Returns received by the Chief Gold Commissioner for the month of December, afford conclusive evidence of the productive qualities of our Gold mines. We have seen those from Wine Harbour and Shelbrooke, the former of which gives an average of 1 oz. 12 dwt. of gold per ton of quartz, (a quantity of dirt included), the maximum yield being 5 ounces. attempted to pay for goods, in the store of Magee & At Sherbrooke the average yield per ton of quartz was 24 ounces of gold, worth \$19 per ounce, and the maximum yield 91 ounces per ton. The Times, in an editorial on the peace prospects in America, congratulates the North on the better spirit it displays toward the South, and says from the liberality shown by a portion of the public to-wards relieving the Lancashire distress, it is willing to believe that a clearer perception of the honorable part England has played during the war, now prevails, Mr. Scholefield and Mr. Bright had addressed their constituents at Birmingham on American affairs. The former thought the South had a right to secede, and recommended recognition. The latter took a totally different view.

Nearly all the London papers find fault with Mr.

Bright's speech. There had been heavy gales on the coast of England. No disasters had been as yet reported. A loan was spoken of in France to relieve the disress in the manufacturing districts.

Italy has declined further negotiations with France on the Roman question.

The Austrian Chambers closed with a congratulaory speech by the Emperor.

It says the movement is a proof not only of the deep and genuine sympathy for their suffering kinsmen, but of the good feeling towards the Queen and country at large, and believes that this sympathy will be a new bond of union.

She was descended from Walter, first Baron of Kincardine, who was son of the Earl of Buchan, and Lord of Badenoch, son of Robert II. of Scotland. The family continued to possess the Barony of Kincardine during ten descents, when their land became cardine during ten descents, when their land became the property of the powerful family of Gordon. The celebrated Col. Roy Stewart, the true and trusty friend of "Prince Charlie," was her grand-uncle. Her father, James Stewart, alias "Seumassacknine," was ensign in the rebel army, and carried one of the standards of his uncle's regiment over the bleak heath of Culloden.

The Christian World informs us that the Greeks ave elected Prince Alfred, of England, their King, by acclamation. He has been regularly proclaimed at Athens. Some of the Courts of Europe are very much excited and alarmed in view of this singular nonstration on the part of Greece. The Court of Russia especially is moving strongly against the oice of the Greeks.
