UNITED STATES.

THE SEAT OF WAR.

By late American papers, received through Turner's Express, we are able to furnish important intelligence from several sections of the great battle field:-THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC.

WASHINGTON, July 25 .- The National Republican of this afternoon states that positive information has been received here that Lee has been delaying on the Upper Potomac to enable him to get away safely with the plunder he had collected in Maryland and Pennsylvania and because his forces have been gathering the new crop of grain in the Shenandoah

"He is now moving toward Richmond with im-mense trains of supplies, the necessity of procuring which was increased by the fall of Vicksburgh and which was increased by the fall of Vicksburgh and Port Hudson, and is now intensified by the cutting off the Tennessee and Virginia Railroad, which was a great medium for procuring supplies for Lee's army. It is reported by the Northern papers that General Meade has entrapped General Lee in some way, but it is unworthy of credit. If Meade really thinks so, he will find ere long, that he has caught "an ugly customer." A correspondent of the Boston Journal writing from Meade's army on the 28d July says:—

Meade's army on the 28d July says:—

"There is nothing of stirring interest to send from the army. There has been no fighting since last advices and scarcely any skirmishing worth mentioning. Unless all indications fail we are to have a season of rest in this department, and the soldiers need it very much. The hospitals are full of brokendown officers and men, who were exhausted by the long and rapid marches from Virginia, to Maryland and Pennsylvania, and many of the men in camp are unfitted for duty by blistered feet and lameness. The horses and mules are also exhausted, and the recuperation which they are now receiving will greatly promote their usefulness in the event of an approachpromote their usefulness in the event of an approaching campaign. The marches from Falmouth to Fairfax, of which so much was said, could not have been more severe than those from the latter point to Pennsylvania, but the fatal casualties were not so numer ous from the fact that the weather was much cooler, and there was the best of water all along the road.

"The army of Gen, Meade has not made much of an advance from the Virginia side of the Potomac, opposite Berlin, Md., where it crossed last week. It had been stated that the delay of Lee's army near Winbeen stated that the delay of Lee's army near Winchester is for the purpose of preparing for an attack, but the idea is treated with levity in the army. An exaggerated estimate of Lee's force would not be over eighty thousand effective men, and it is idle to believe that he will bring it to bear upon the overpowering force of Gen. Meade. Both armies need recuperation, and it is likely to be weeks, if not months, before there is a fight, and not then unless Gen. Meade assumes the offensive. Some of the symptoms strengthening this belief are the numerous furloughs now being granted, and the return of sutlers and newspaper venders within the lines." ders within the lines."

General Rosecrans has not marched upon Chat-tanoga in Tennesee and Rome in Georgia, as we had it reported. He is now at Nashville preparing for a rward movement from Tullahoma.

"CHARLESTON, July 22 .- The Richmond Whigh says the enemy commenced shelling again yesterday, with but few casualties. We had in the battle of the 18th inst. about 150 killed and wounded. The enemy's loss in killed and prisoners was about 2000. Nearly 800 were buried under flag of truce. Col. Putnam, acting Brig.-General, and Col. Shaw, commanding the negro regiment, were killed."

The New York Herald gives the following accour

"On the 19th the rebels attempted to drive our forces from James Island. The attack was sudden and unexpected, but Gen. Terry met and repulsed them with great slaughter. The gunboat Pawnee, which supported the left flank, grounded, and a rebel battery opened upon her, firing about fifty shots, thirty-nine of which hit her. She subsequently floated off and opened upon the rebels, putting them to flight. Our casualties were small, and the rebels were taught a lesson they will not soon forget. The bombardment of Fort Wagner was renewed on the morning of the 22d, the iron-clads co-operating with the army. During the day, Fort Wagner was silenced for some time, and the colors shot away. New Union batteries were opened upon the rebels, doing great execution. A charge was made on Fort Wagner, and our troops, after a desperate charge, were obliged to fall back, which they did in excellent order, and held their old positions. The loss on our side was quite severe; but our total loss in killed, wounded, and missing since the 10th is only about one thousand.
