Telegrams from Cracow state that the Polish leader Broniewski has met with considerable success at Nagoszew, in the palatinate of Plock, and that in Lithuania an engagement, favourable to the insur-gents, has taken place at Olkienika, near Kowno. Governor Mouravieff is stated to have committed fresh atrocities, having caused the Abbe Zumecki and the land owner Leskewicz to be shot, and the Polish chief Colysko to be hung. The Opinion Nationale, of Paris, comments on the wonderfui manuer in which the National has supplanted the Imperial Government in Warsaw, and observes that the presence of the Russian authorities is now the Telegrams from Cracow state that the Polish leader the presence of the Russian authorities is now the only obstacle to the establishment of perfect order, tranquillity, and security in the capital of Poland.
