freedom and bounty at the end of the war. If this ten fold. The Federal force now advancing on Little Rock, is supposed to number 20,000 infantry, and 10,000 cavalry. The rebels are fortifying at Bayou Meta, about fifteen miles this side of Little Rock, said to be a point of many advantages, and, if well fortified and defended, most difficult to take.

Reports about the state of Sumpter are very contradictory. At one time we are told that it is completely shattered and nearly demolished, and again it is said to be undergoing repairs, and will soon be in readiness to do its part in resisting the terrible siege. The guns brought to bear upon the doomed city are thus described by the Boston Journal :---

The gun from which the shells were first fired was a 200-pounder Parrott, which can throw a shell no less than seven miles, when aimed at an angle of forty-five degrees. The first shells went over Charleston, the gun being aimed at too sharp an angle. Our readers will be pleased to learn that Gen. Gillmore has no less than thirty Parrott guns mounted that will throw shells plump into Charleston. Also that the use of Greek fire shells to bombard that rebel stronghold was personally ordered by President Lincoln. The Greek fire burns for twenty minutes. It will burn on the water as well as on land, and each shell covers a surface of one hundred square feet with flame. The shell bursts into about one hundred and twenty pieces, or ten times as many as the ordinary Of course the effect of these shells will be to set Charleston in flames, which nothing can subdue,

In addition to the Greek fire shells, a large quantity of improved shrapnel shells, made by the inventor of the Greek fire shell, and containing from five hundred to one thousand bullets each have been sent to Morris Island, to be transferred thence into the rebellious city in a manner not very pleasing to the enemy. These shells are fired with time fuses, and are very destructive of life. The celebrated three hundred-pound Parrott gun which General Gillmore has, weighs twenty seven thousand pounds. It took two thousand men nine nights to get the monster into position, the drag teams breaking down seven nights

in succession, the enemy shelling the party all the while, and men being killed nightly. Nothing was done with it by day, the gun being covered with bushes to conceal it from the enemy's fire. The powder twenty-five pounds, and the shell that goes out of it is as high as a flour barrel, weighs three hundred pounds, and contains seventeen pounds of mortar powder. The execution of one of these shells on Sumter is considered equal to three 200-pound shells. But two of these immense rifled guns have been made, although twenty more have been ordered for the army. None have been ordered for the navy. Gen. Gillmore at first had only one, but another has just been sent to him.

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.-The Herald's Morris Island letter of the 1st inst. states that for two or three days past a new rebel battery on Sullivan's Island has been making fruitless attempts to annoy our men in the advanced trenches. It is supposed to be one of the 11inch guns taken from the Keokuk. The firing is very good, except its range is short, and it is only at long intervals that a shot from it reaches the Island.

Four monitors-the Passaic, Patapsco, Nahant, and Montauk-came in yesterday afternoon and engaged Fort Moultrie and the batteries on Sullivan's Island, firing an occasional shot at Sumter and Wagner. The engagement opened at 3.30, and for about two hours was maintained with great intensity, particularly on the rebel side. The firing from Moultrie and battery Bee was terrific ; their heavy guns rattled off like a snare drum in tattoo, and the water about the monitors was jetting up in all directions. Several shots threw tons of water in a perfect cataract over their turrets and decks, shaking them with the concussion. Many shots struck the monitors, but did be the same in all cases, without reference to age, little damage. The heavy rifle and 15-inch shells of the ironclads burst with effect over and in Moultrie, and sent the earth whirling in all directions. Fort Wagner was repeatedly struck by the exploding shells and somewhat damaged. She fired but few shots during the contest, at the monitors. Battery Gregg was exceedingly active. Her heavy gun was in play from the first to the last of the engagement, and made some excellent shots. The monitors' shells went on all sides, and had no effect in silencing her guns. Sumter was struck several times by rifle shells from the Passaic and Patapsco, but besides detaching masses of loose masonry it did no further damage to the fort. No guns were dismounted, if they exist, and no further reduction accomplished. After two or three hours' fighting, the monitors responded to the general signal from the Ironsides to cease firing and withdraw. What the object of the attack was has not been developed. Some days since the enemy made a systematic effort to blow up and destroy the gunboats and transports in Stone Inlet by means of torpedoes. Fortunately no serious damage was in-flicted upon any of the vessels by those torpedoes, but the escape was quite narrow enough for comfort. One torpedo exploded a little astern of the Pawnee and blew her launch, which was turning astern, to fragments. A few minutes later a tremendous explosion occurred on Bud Key, a few rods below the Pawnee, occasioned by another torpedo, sent down at the same time. From facts since developed, it is certain that the rebels sent down on that night at least ten of these inventions, three or four of which exploded, and four of which were picked up. One drifted through the fleet of transports and up the Folly River, and exploded under the bows of the moriar schooner C. P. Williams, but occasioned no damage. The torpe-does are precisely like those found in the Light-bouse Creek, and go off at the slightest concussion. For the second time at the request of Admiral Dahlgren our batteries are firing on Sumter. How many times the fort has got to be reduced before the navy can go in remains to be seen. The heavy rifles are firing steadily to day, and as I close. What the effect on Sumter is I cannot tell. It is already a ruin, and cannot be battered down much more. Still we must

Compelled by thirst some of the soldiers are so imprudent as to swallow it; the next day they are in the hospitals and before the close of the week many of them are in their graves.

Brave attempts have been made to supply the gar rison from Charleston, but thus far only a small quantity has been firmished. Only at midnight, or under cover of some dense fog in the morning, have any vessels been known to reach them for the past eight days. If the Monitors would only cut off con munication one week longer the fort would be in our possession, and with Fort Wagner, Fort Gregg and the whole of Morris Island once ours, the stars and stripes in a few hours would wave over Fort Sumter. But what the Monitors should have done long since,

Gen. Gillmore with his engineers and artillerists will probably accomplish before many days. We are now within one hundred yards of Fort

Wagner. By to-morrow our heaviest Parrotts will be able to deliver a fire at the distance of two hundred yards into every embrasure commanding the beach, and an enfilading one upon every gun looking sea-ward. Showers of grape and cannister will also be poured upon the gunners the moment they leave their bound-proofs and commence working their pie-ces. At the distance of two thousand yards, the fif-teen and eleven inch shell of the monitors seem to teen and eleven inch shell of the monitors seem to have but little effect upon sand embankments, and seldom penetrate more than seven or eight feet. The bomb-proofs of Wagner being covered with nearly thirty feet of sand and timber, it is but a waste of aumunition to fire at so great a distance. If we can believe the reports of deserters and prisoners, not one of our shots have yet penetrated any of the bomb-proofs by direct fire. One tifteen inch shell happened to roll down the passage way to the bomb-proofs, and exploded in the midst of about one hundred men without wounding one of them. The story is vouch-ed for by several deserters coming within our lines at different times. Yesterday the monitors and the ironsides engaged the batteries on Sullivan's Island, at the distance of one mile and a quarter. As usual,
