THE SACKING OF LAWRENCE.

The destruction of this city and the massacre of its inhabitants, is one of the most fearful and brutal episodes in this terrible war. The horrifying scenes of Cawnpore have been reproduced under the leadership of the noted Quantrill, the Missouri Guerilla Chieftain. This awful tragedy took place at midnight, and the unsuspecting citizens, men, women and children, were ushered into eternity in an unexpected moment by the deadly weapons of their fiendish murderers. ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY persons are reported as slain amid the burning ruins of their bitherto peaceful homes. No resistance appears to have been offered, and hence the work of destruction went rapidly forward until its bloody triumphs were completed. As illustrations of the horrors of the hour, it is said that twelve men were driven into a building, there shot, and the house burned to ashes. Twenty-five negro recruits were shot. The bodies of the murdered people were thrown into wells and

The principal part of the city was burned to ashes The loss is supposed to be not less than two millions of dollars. Two banks were robbed, and all that the plunderers could lay their hands upon was carried off by them.

We regret to state that Mr. Lemuel Fillmore fell a victim to this wholesale slaughter. A letter was received by a friend in the city on Tuesday last, from Mr. H. S. Fillmore, dated New York, which confirms the report of his brother's death, and says, that their property in Lawrence was seriously injured. We sympathise deeply with him in this sad calamity. As he does not speak of his mother in his brief note, we presume that she escaped the fate of her unfortunate son.

The New York Herald of the 24th ult., furnishes the following tribute to the memory of the departed :-"Some eight or ten years ago, Mr. Lemuel Fillmore a graduate of an Academy on the Hudson, came into our employment as a reporter, and served in that capacity, and with great credit to himself and satisfaction to us for several years. He accompanied General Johnston in his Mormon Expedition as special correspondent of the Herald, and endured all the hardships of that winter campaign. Soon after his return he joined his brother in a commercial enterprise, and established an extensive dry goods house in Lawrence. By their attention and industry they succeeded in drawing to themselves all the dry goods business of the city, and was soon able to erect a large substantial store exactly opposite the Eldridge

"Mr. Fillmore, with his mother, wife, and two young children, owned and occupied a handsome cottage house in the outskirts of the town where it is probable he was murdered." Such is the sad end of this young man, who by the power of his own talents and energy, had raised himself to prominence and influence in society. The Herald in conclusion says, "that Lawrence was a New England town, transferred to the Far West with all its refinements of life and manners. On the side of its business streets were to be seen as elegant and well dressed ladies as may be met with in New York or Philadelphia, and society was on a level far above what would be looked for in a frontier town. The massacre of Lawrence, we fear, will be the preface to a border warfare more terrible and relentless than any that history records."
