JAPAN is again presenting a hostile attitude to foreigners. The government of the Tycoon is in sad perplexity between contending parties. The result is a collision between the defenders of the Government of Japan and the naval forces of France and the United States. New York, Oct. 3.—The Herald's "sensation Baltimore correspondent has news from the South that Johnston's army in Northern Georgia numbers 135,000 men, including Longstreet's corps of 30,000,
