COLONIAL.

Mr. Stephen Wiggins, one of our wealthiest citizens, died at his residence in this city on Friday last, at the advanced age of 82. We learn from the Globe that he has made some munificent bequests for charitable purposes, among others-£22,000 for the erecting and endowment of an Orphan Asylum for Males, the same to be untouched until, by accumulation of interest it shall have reached £25,000; land on which to erect a Female Orphan Asylum, provided others endow it to the extent of £10,000; £2,200 for the better accommodation of the inmates of the Lunatic Asylum; and £500 to the Church of England Diocesan Society.

We regret to learn that the freshet in the Upper Miramichi has been so great as to cause the loss of lumber to the value of \$20,000 or \$30,000. The River Boom, and the South West Boom, both gave way under the pressure.

ENGLISH AND CONTINENTAL.

The news from England is of no great importance. All fears of a war between the United States and England are abandoned.

Many of our readers (says the Times), have probably been unable to reconcile the continued decrease of pauperism in Lancashire with the continued tale of Lancashire distress. Measured by what would appear to be the unerring test of figures, the distress of the Cotton Districts seems to be steadily and distinctly on the decline: It is impossible to doubt either the authenticity or the import of such tables as we have recently published. In the 16 weeks which ended with March, 1863, the net decrease in the pauperism of the whole district was 57,300. In the first week of last month the additional decrease was 8,820; in the second week 60; in the third week, 5,590; in the fourth week, 5,573. We learn, too, from the report of the Secretary to the Central Relief Fund that the demands on the Fund have been steadily declining, and that the reduction in the numbers of those receiving relief has been very considerable in-deed. Yet, in the face of all these unimpeachable statements, we have been assured on good authority that the state of Lancashire is not only as critical as ever, but that it now at least demands, what has been dispensed with hitherto, the intervention of Government. How are these representations to be recon-

We believe the truth to be this -that a certain revival in the Cotton trade, coupled with an extension of outdoor employment and a gradual dispersion of the population, has brought about that decrease in the numbers relieved which the reports exhibit, but that enough distress still remains to call for remedial measures, while the absolute restoration of the Cotton industry isas far off as ever.

A Blue-book, containing the Twenty-fourth annual Report of the Registrar-General of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in England during the year 1861, has been issued. It is dated the 31st of March last. The excess of births over deaths in the year was 261,292. The conjunction of a high birth-rate, with a low death-rate caused that excess to be greater than the usual amount, which in the present stage of the populution may be stated as nearly 245,000. About 80, 000 English emigrants left their country for foreign and colonial settlements in 1861.

THE SEAT OF WAR.

From the Church Witness of Wednesday.

The interest of the war is now entirely concentrated in the movements of the belligerent forces in the Southwest. The Federal General Grant has followed up his success at Jackson, and invested Vicksburg-capturing in his progress there 6000 prisoners and 64 cannon. It was reported, indeed, that he had taken the city, but this is contradicted by later advices. He, however, commands the town, and has his colors planted on the outworks, and no doubt was entertained of his complete success. Haines' Bluff has also been reduced by the Federal squadron, and Port Hudson is threatened. Matters look gloomy for the Confederates in that quarter, as the reduction of Port Hudson and Vicksburg would open the Mississippi to the States of the North West, diminish the growing disaffection of the population m those States, and enable the Federals to claim one more of the real victories of the war. The following is the official report of the Federal operations in this

Rear of Vicksburg, May 20. The army of the Tennessee landed at Brulensberg on the 30th of April. On the 1st of May we fought the battle of Port Gibson, and defeated the rebels under Gen. Bowen, whose loss in killed, wounded and prisoners was at least 1500, and loss in artillery five pieces.

On the 12th of May, at the battle of Raymond, the rebels were defeated with a loss of 800. On the 14th of May, we defeated Gen. Joe Johnston and captured Jackson, Miss., with a loss to the enemy of 400, besides immense stores and manufactures and seventeen pieces of artillery.

On the 16th of May we fought the bloody and decisive battle of Baker's Creek, in which the entire force of Vicksburg, under Gen. Pemberton, was defeated with the loss of 29 pieces of artil ery and 4000 men. On the 17th of May we defeated the same force at the Big Black River Bridge, with the loss of 2600 men and 17 pieces of artillery. On the 18th of May we invested Vicksburg closely. To day Gen. Steele carried the rifle pits on the north of the city; the right of the army rests on the Mississippi, above Vicksburg.
