THE THE PARTATIES TO STATE THE SEAT OF WAR.

The war news this week is meagre and unreliable. The correspondence of the New York Tribune furnishes the following items of interest from the army of the POTOMAC.

On Monday morning Buford went through Thoroughfare Gap with two brigades of cavalry. The Rebel infantry got behind him and he had to cut his way back through the infantry and through the Gap to New-Baltimore, where he encamped on Monday night. On Tuesday morning he moved in again through Thoroughfare Gap, this time successfully.

On Monday there was skirmishing all day. In the

afternoon Stuart made a dash on our lines and captured the 7th Maryland infantry, 3d Division, 1st Corps, just at the right of Thoroughfare Gap. Monday night the 2d and 3d Corps camped at Bristoe, and marched to Bealton on Tuesday.

On Tuesday affairs were generally more quiet. All heavy baggage was sent to the rear, and the army stripped for the fight which we supposed likely to ensue on the morrow.

Gen. Lee, it is positively stated, was at Warrenton on Monday, and had formed his line of battle and posted his artillery. Our troops were moving steadily onward in two

Gen. Custer reports that in the engagement on Monday we drove the Rebel cavalry from Gainesville to beyond Buckland Mills, five miles westward. At this point Gen. Custer's encountered a Rebel line of battle, infantry and artillery, at least a mile

Gen. Davis's Cavalry Brigade and Battery were at one time entirely cut off by the Rebels, but he suced in extricating himself. We lost about 200 in killed and wounded and

missing, and several wagons, one of which contains the official papers of the brigade. The Rebel newspapers say that Gen. Lee has cap-

tured 10,000 of our troops, a full battery, and a large number of wagons during his late campaign. It is sufficient to remark in answer to this that the official reports contradict this statement. It was said by Rebel officers that Gen. Lee having

driven Gen. Meade back toward Washington and destroyed a portion of the Orange and Alexandria Bailroad, that either Gen. Hill's or Gen. Ewell's corps would now be immediately dispatched to the assistance of Gen. Bragg.

The Army of the Potomac now holds the country east of the Rappahannock, with no signs of a battle. The hasty retreat of the Rebel army, their officers say, was caused by a want of provisions, and when Stuart passed through Warrenton he did not stop to feed his men, though he admitted they had eaten nothing for 24 hours. It was also said by their officers that having destroyed a portion of the Alexandria and Orange Railroad, Lee would have time to send troops to the assistance of Bragg.

TRANSAL PROMOCHARLESTON, bus 1009 FOLLY ISLAND, Oct. 19, 1868. Nothing whatever of interest has occurred for the past week. There has been little firing on either side. The Confederates appear to be waiting the opening of Gen, Gillmore's guns on the city. In the mean time they are not idle, a new battery having belched forth its thunder at us from James Island proving that they are still adding to the number of their fortifications. It is stated that the Rebels have several rams in Pocatoligo River, which causes no little uneasiness in regard to our vessels in Port Royal harbor. It is proposed to place a number of torpedoes across the stream to prevent their egress.

CHATTANOGA, Wednesday, Oct. 21, 1863. Via Nashville, Thursday. Oct. 22. Gen. Rosecrans received the order relieving him from command on Monday evening, and yesterday left for Cincinnati, where he is directed to report. He is accompanied by only two personal aids.

PROM CHATTANOOGA.
