I have myself often thought far from favourably of him and his proceedings, but during the past two months his actions have seemed so good and wise, and his policy has seemed so kind and conciliatory, that he was gaining friends of his opponents every day; but this blow aimed so successfully at his life, has conquered every prejudice and made every man his friend, and the hardest hearts have given away and felt they had lost a good friend, and a man who whatever his failings may have been, truly loved his country above all else, and who has been laid on the altar, just as his greatness and his wisdom would have shined the brightest to every man not hardened by

prejudice and party spirit.

Boston, April 24. Official advices state that Sherman and Johnson had agreed upon terms for the surrender of the latter, including all the rebel forces now under arms against the United States. An armistice was also agreed upon until each could consult with their respective authorities. The armistice was signed on the 18th, and the facts communicated to the Washington Gov-

ernment on the 21st. The President and Cabinet immediately assembled, and unanimously refused to confirm Sherman's action, which accorded political concessions not authorized, and despatched Gen. Grant at once to Sherman's headquarters, with orders to resume hostilities forthwith, and compel Johnson to fight or surrender without any political conditions

It is feared that Sherman's armistice will afford Jefferson Davis, who was with Johnson, an opportunity to escape into Texas. The President's Funeral Cortege will reach this city
