The discharge is very acrid, its presence, therefore tends to increase and extend the inflammation. If proceeding from the Middle Ear, the Drum-head must have been perforated by the inflamation, which gave rise to the discharge in the first instance; sooner or later, the Drum head will slough off entirely and even the small bones may, one after another, be lost. They are frequently found among the discharge, by the patients or friends, and shown as something strange, that came away from the Ear.


