UNITED STATES.

RICHMOND-ITS DESTITUTION AND ITS CRIMES .-The city, like Rome, is said to be built on seven hills. This is poetry and not fact. The ground, however, up to our Government. om the river gradually in most parts, abruptly in others, and makes a circle of hills whose tops stretch away into a large table land on which the town, especially, as you approach it, a very picturesque appearauce. I never saw a city more handsemely situated. Before the war broke out, Richmond was flourishing pecuniarly. It had a popula-tion of over 40,000. How changed to-day! "How doth the city sit solitary that was full of people!" Its freshness is gone. The trees are green, but on all sides there are calls for the painter and glazier. Its business is prostrate. The war has given an impetus to the industry of Northern cities. It has strewn the South, with poverty and blight. We saw one ship on the stocks as we went up to the wharf, and that was begun before the war.

Added to all this prostration, is the destruction by the fire. I should think a mile square of solid buildings, embracing the best business part of the city, is in ashes. From early morn till late in the afternoon it raged before a strong wind. Of course rebel sympathizers deny that this was done by authority, but rumor says there, that a Cabinet meeting on the day previous, resulted in the determination to hand their Capital over to us in ruins. There is no difficulty in believing that they who could do what we know they have done, could also add this to their other crimes. The people of this ill-fated city were near enough to beggary before. Their business was destroyed. Much of their surplus funds were invested in Confederate bonds-and now this terrible fire fills up the cup of their misery. Men who owned thousands of dollars' worth of real estate Monday morning, were penniless Monday night.

We think we have suffered in the North. I wish you could go there and see and hear what I did. Nor is their suffering gone. It continues. There is no with. There is no attempt to rebuild the waste places. A few shops are open, but their shelves are nearly empty, and buyers are few. People in seedy clothes walk the streets looking upon the desolation their folly invited, without money and without employment. They would work, but no one asks them to. I have read of faded gentility, but I never before realized so vividly what it was. Why, it would almost bring tears to your eyes to go thro' their market and look upon its leanness. Without the bounty of our Military Authorities, their people would starve. Famlies, once living in affluence, now go to the Com-missary Department with their baskets and bags to receive their daily rations, to satisfy their hunger. himself a comfortable dinner. Not only do our Military Authorities deal out rations, but the Sanitary, Union and Christian Commissions have also done it. One day just before I arrived there, the Christian

Commission distributed 8000 rations.

1 went from Castle Thunder to some of the slave jails. Here, too, are memories of oppression and cruelty. I went into the yard of one of them, where, my guide told me, he had seen 300 Union men at once, their hands tied under their knees, and a billet of wood thrust into their mouths, for no other crime than of loving the Union. These walls have been witnesses of other sufferings and listened to other groans than those I have just alluded to. It is well known that Richmond has been the great slave mart of Virginia. I suppose that for the ten years previous to the war, 10,000 slaves were annually brought to market here. In 1856 The Richmond Despach said "there were \$1,000,000 in town seeking investment in this kind of property." Husbands have been torn from wives, mothers from children, the children from the cradle, brought here and shut up in these dens, of which there are many in the city. They have been examined by selfish and sensual men as one would examine cattle in the market. Their sensitiveness has been wounded, womanly delicacy tramp-pled upon, and affections mocked. Who can tell how these hard floors have been wet with tears and how these walls have echoed with groans. Fifty slaves were marched from one of these jails the day of the evacuation. As I stood there and recalled these things, I wondered that the hand of judgment these things, I wondered that the hand of judgment had not overtaken these guilty ones before and brought them to their just punishment. I thanked God that I had lived long enough to see the locks of those doors broken open and the keys thrown away, and the people who had once walked in fear of them now singing the song of deliverance.

THE DEATH OF MRS. SEWARD. - The whole country will deeply sympathize with the Secretary of State in the loss of his companion, who died at Washington yesterday. Mrs. Seward hastened to the capital on receiving the intelligence of the attempted assassina-tion of her husband and son, and has since watched over and cared for them with all the tenderness and devotion of a wife and mother. Her constitution, before feeble, has given was under the burden of toil, care and anxiety through which she passed, and she has gone to rest.

It is announced officially that Kirby Smith has aigned the terms of surrender agreed upon at New Orleans, and that the United States authority is re-

stored in Texas, the important ports being garrisoned

by our troops The President has issued a proclamation raising the blockade of the Texas ports. That closes the work of the blockading squadron. A terrible accident occurred on Thursday, on the

Ohio and Mississippi Railroad, in Indiana. Seventeen persons were killed and one hundred and fifty wounded. Rear-Admiral Dupont died in Philadelphia vester-

day, after an hour's illness.
