ESCAPE OF STEPHENS.

Stephens, the Fenian, has by some means escaped from prison, and, as might be expected, great excitement prevails. Despatches were forwarded to the constabulary throughout Ireland apprising them of the mysterious fact

Later telegrams, speaking of the escape of Stephens from Richmond prison, say he must have been aided by persons having access to the prison. From his cell to the outer wall, over which he got by some unex-plained means, Stephens had to pass through no less

The London Freeman of the 22d, referring to the slanderous reports propagated in relation to the part Jamaica in the negro revolt, editorially says :-

The news of the week is of course that in continuation of former accounts from Jamaica. We have now not only the information furnished to the public from the usual sources, but Governor Eyre's own account of the whole affair. We have commented on both the general news and the Governor's defence elsewhere. They both confirm our first impressions, which we published last week; and leave little doubt that the charge of an organised rebellion will be utterly exploded by the investigation which must now take place. The press of the country seems to be generally sound, and denounces, as Englishmen might be expected to do, the hideous slaughter of fugitives, captives, and even self-surrendered men. There is, indeed one notable exception. We thought the audacious falsehood of The Times last week, almost beneath notice: very properly, however, Mr. Brock refuted it at length at a meeting, and Sir Morton Peto sent an unanswerable letter to The Times itself. The Times asked in reply whether Mr. Knibb was a Baptist minister? Sir Morton quietly replied that he was one of our most esteemed and devoted ministers. Whereupon, as if it was Sir Morton's duty to reply to unknown charges, it asked for a "little more about Mr. Knibb," and whether Mr. Gordon was a Baptist? Sir Morton condescended to furnish "more;" mentioning the utter break-down at the time of the charges against Mr. Knibb, and of the suborned testimony against him; and referring The Times also to his services afterwards rendered to the Government, and to his evidence taken before a Committee of the House of Commons.
