RAILWAY EXTENSION.

It will be seen by WESTERN EXTENSION appeal in another column that only \$80,000 are required to enable the Company to complete the contract. We are assured by reliable authority that this will be forthcoming.

Dr. Tupper reports through the Colonist the completion of negotiations to connect Truro with Moncton. He says :-

Contracts have been executed between the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and the International Contract Company, for the immediate construction of the Railway from Truro to Moncton. involving no greater expense to the Province than that contemplated by the act, viz. : Thirty Thousand Pounds Currency per annum for twenty years.* *

The immediate expenditure of over half a million of foreign capital in the Province, must give a most important impetus to the trade of the country, while the effect in that respect of connecting these two Provinces by rail can hardly be over-estimated, especially now, that arrangements have been made for the completion of the European and North American Railway. The company are bound by the contract to complete the line and open it for traffic in four years from November next."

All this encourage the hope that both Eastern and Western Extension will, in a few short years, be carried forward to a successful issue, connecting St. John by railway with Halifax and the broad Atlantic, and on the other with the United States and the Canadas. "Confederation" and the "Intercolonial Track" will be the crowning act of this mighty schem.e

ARRIVAL OF THE "HIBERNIA."

NEW YORK, 11th.

Steamship "Hibernia" passed Father Point with dates to Sept. 1st.

The Atlantic Telegraph Company having issued a formal notice that they will not attempt to recover the Cable this year, the underwriters consider this equivalent to a total loss, and have settled insurances on the Cable. The Company has ordered a new Cable-to be laid next Spring.

Benjamin, the ex secretary from America, had arrived at Southampton. The West India steamer in which he arrived, took fire when about fifty miles from St. Thomas, and put back with speed. After much difficulty the fire was put out. She brought near £170,000 in specie.
