We regret that " Charity " was unable to comprehend what the Visitor meant last week by the remark, "forget to do honor to common sense." but it is not remarkable that one who has studied the doctrine of Provincial Confederation for "the last ten years" with so little profit as his communicavion indicates, should even fail to comprehend a plain English sentence. We have only to confess our inability to make it any plainer, and to assure our friend that the idea conveyed applies with equal force to the sentiments, special pleadings, and illustrations, as expressed in his article.

The confederation of the Provinces of British America having been crushed in embryo by the decision of the late New Brunswick elections, the government of Nova Scotia suggests a re-consideration of the proposition to combine the Maritime Provinces in a Legislative union. The following resolutions were placed upon the table by Dr. Tupper, the leader of the Government, on the 23d inst. :--

Whereas, under existing circumstances, an immediate Union of the British North American Provinces has become impracticable :

And whereas a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces is desirable, whether the larger Union be accomplished or not;

Resolved-That, in the opinion of this House, the negotiations for the Union of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, should be resumed, in accordance with the resolution passed at the last session of the Legislature.

These resolutions will afford ample opportunity to discuss the whole question of confederation in its most enlarged, as well as in its most minute bearings; and the debate, therefore, will bring forth the best talents of contending parties, and will doubtless be highly instructive. All parties feel that these Provinces can not long remain in their present isolated condition, and that some important change is impending. We trust the leading statesmen of these colonies will for once break away from the shackles of party lines, and combine their wisdom and energy in working out such a plan as shall be mutually beneficial to the whole.

The Chronicle, of Halifax, which changed hands in consequence of its opposition to the confederation scheme, gives in its adhesion to this new measure in the following style : --

We have said on the platform and in this paper, that we are entirely in favor of a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces, and will give Dr. Tupper or any body else who sincerely labours to bring it about, our support in the House and out of it. Should there be any disinclination on the part of our sister Provinces to hastily take this step, then let us prepare the way for it by adopting a policy calculated to bind us all together. A precedent was established some years ago, which proves that mighty good may be done by a free interchange of thought, even should there be at present an indisposition to go further.

The late Government held a final meeting in Fredericton last week, finished up their business and resigned their trust.

Before their resignation the following gentlemen were appointed to office, viz : Francis Ferguson, Esq., Deputy Treasurer at Chatham ; Mr. Charles Watters. Clerk of the Crown ; Mr. Paul, Sheriff of Charlotte County, in place of Sheriff Jones deceased. The Sheriffs of the respective counties were all appointed for the year.

Many of the friends of the late Government will regret that all this business was not left to be disposed of by their successors. We do not dispute their right to fill vacant offices, but what is lawful is not always expedient.

# ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

# ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP "AMERICA."

NEW YORK. MARCH 26 .- The steamship America, from Bremen via Southampton, arrived to-night. The steamship Europa, from Boston, arrived out on the 12th, the Lafayette on the 18th, and the City of Dublin on the 14th.

In the House of Commons, on the 13th, the Chancellor of the Exchequer stated that he would make the financial statement on April 27.

Mr. Fitzgerald called attention to Col. Jervis's report on the Canadian defences. He disclaimed any intention to attribute to the Federals or to the people generally a spirit of hostility towards England. Ŵe should not disregard a certain proposal made during the recent conference between the Federals and Confederates. It was important to look to the Canadian defences, in the event of a war, and we ought to come to an immediate understanding with Canada as to the proportion England should bear of the cost of its means of defence.

Mr. Forster believed that the fear of hostilities was unreasonable and utterly groundless, and protested against any expense for the defence of Canada.

Mr. Cardwell assured the House that our relations with' America continued perfectly friendly, but the Government was prepared to defend Canada.

Mr. Disraeli thought Canada should be properly defended.

Mr. Lowe said the most effectual course in the event of Canada becoming a battle ground would be to concentrate a force upon some other point. We had better let Canada know the truth, and not buoy her up with false expectations while we provoked America with a standing menace. The wisest course would be to withhold all troops at once.

Mr. Watkins said to prevent war England should declare Canada a part of the British Empire and defend it.

Mr. Bright said the root of these misunderstandings was the feeling of jealousy entertained in England towards the American nation. Every one knows England could not hold Canada in case of war. What would England have said if she had suffered as

the Americans have from the Alabama? Lord Palmerston denied that England was jealous and believed there was a good feeling towards England among the great bulk of Americans. No doubt both North and South have some feeling for our nonespousal of their course ; but this was no reason why we should not place Canada in a state of defence. He could not agree with some that it was not the intention of the Government to follow his advice. The relations between England and America were perfectly friendly.
