Government, and plotting the ruin of their country. We read in the papers a short time since, that the Western States were full of conspirators striving to overturn the Republic. Judge Holt, we are told, has succeeded in tracing out and exposing the leaders of the wide-spread organization for subverting the rule and authority of the United States Government. True, Arnold was entrusted with an important command-for West Point was the key to the Hudson, and all the Provinces North and West; but the question is, if any of those persons alluded to by Mr. Everett and Judge Holt had been in Arnold's place, or rather were similarly circumstanced now, would be not have been equally ready to sell his country? 1 believe that a man who can plot the destruction of his Government is no more to be trusted at one time than at another.

I find by the Crown Land Office Records that Be nedict Arnold obtained a grant of lots 3 and 7, of A and B, below the town of Fredericton, situate (as I would here add) a little below the residence of Hon. Charles Fisher. The lots were afterwards re-granted to the College. Arnold lived in Fredericton about 18 months, and it is said that the ruins of his dwelling house are still to be seen. I also find that lots Nos. 23 and 24, East side, and 23, 25 and 31 on the Brunswick for the purpose of taking charge of a West side of the old Westmorland Road, containing 1200 acres, included in the grant of Wm. Hazen, Jr., and 18 others, were granted to Benedict Arnold, 19th June, 1789-situate in the Parish of Hampton, intention, and decided upon India as the field of his King's County, and not far from the Ossekeag Station

We are all aware, from what we have been told, that Arnold built a house and resided in King street for some time; and that his place of business stood where the new Sugar Refinery now is, corner of Main and Charlotte streets; that his store was destroyed by fire, and that he was accused of being the incendiary, for the sake of recovering the insurance-notwithstanding the man himself was not present at the time, and his son, who slept in the second story, narrowly escaped with his life. In 1786 Arnold built a ship at a place called Spry's Grant, on this river, about 40 miles above Indiantown, and on the 1st of June she was taken through the Falls, which was regarded as a great experiment for so large a vessel. 300 tons. The newspaper from which I copy, dated 1786, did not hold the General in such contemptible regard as we are led to suppose was very common; for in speaking of him in connection with this enterprise the editor remarked : "The General's laudable efforts to promote the interests of the infant colony, have, during his short residence, been very productive to its commercial advantages, and as such deserves the praise of every well-wisher to its prosperity."

Confederation

is progressing favourably in Canada. The general impression is, that it will be adopted by the Canadian Legislature by a large majority.

In Nova Scotia the excitement on the subject is at high water mark. Meetings are being held almost daily in some sections of that Province. A recent meeting at Kentville lasted nearly all day, and the opposition presented a strong front. In Pictou county the Attorney General, Archibald, after speaking an honr in favor of Confederation was hooted down. The two great parties arrange themselves on either side without the slightest reference to former political combinations. We regret to see so much bitterness of feeling exhibited in the discussions. . In Prince Edward Island it is thought there will

be a large majority against the Union.

In New Brunswick the opposition is mustering its forces, and makes uo mean display of talent or of tact; but the advocates for Confederation are not disheartened. The addresses of Hon. Messrs Chandler, Tilley, Gray, Fisher and Steadman, are multiplying converts on all hands.

The Presbyterian Witness, of Halifax, ably advocates Confederation. The Messenger and the Wesleyan are also in favour of the scheme. The Religious Intelligencer, in its last issue, declares itself strongly inclined to the union. The Telegraph daily, as we anticipated, has declared itself in distinct utterances on the side of Colonial Confederacy. So far as this Province is concerned, the whole question has been honourably and fairly submitted to the people, and by the Government they are asked in the free exercise of their rights, to examine and decide for themselves. What more could we desire?

How this matter will be decided no one can yet divine. For ourselves we intend to weigh every phase of this question in the scales of calm deliberation and unbiassed judgment, leaving the issues with Him who superintends the 'interests of the universe and guides the destiny of nations. " Not a sparrow nor a worm but is found in the book of his decree.' Let His supremacy be distinctly recognized by all, and then all decisions will be founded upon a safe basis.

A MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE. - A letter from Rev. B. N. Hughes, of St. George, informs us that two 2nd. men, Williamson and Bolton, having families at the Upper Falls, were working in the woods, about six miles above. On the 27th ult., after the labours of ville. the day, they returned to rest. In the night Williamson was aroused from slumber by the burning of pelled to retire. his hands. To his amazement he saw the camp was wrapped in flames. He rushed for the door, and fortunately struck it with his head, it flew open and he barely escaped with his life. The fire by this time had advanced so far that all attempts to save Bolton were unavailing. Fortunately he had a horse in the stable; he mounted him and hastened to the nearest dwelling, some ten miles distant, and the snow very deep. He had nothing on his head or hands, and but little on his body or feet. By a desperate effort, however, he reached the house as the day was breaking, burned, frozen and fearfully chilled; but, alas! for the poor man Bolton, he perished in the flames of the burning camp. Mr. Hughes with four other gentleman hastened to the place of disaster, and arrived about half-past ten A. M. The camp by this time was nearly destroyed, and the charred remains of the unfortunate Bolton were discovered under a small part of the camp covering which had been preserved from fire by the snow. The legs and arms were completely consumed, and nothing remained but the body, neck and head in a burned and disfigured condition. The deceased leaves a wife, several children, and a widowed mother to deplore their sad loss. The prospect of Mr. Williamson's recovery is not flattering.

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE. - The English mail of last week brought the painful intelligence to Mr. W. A. Compton, of this city, that his son Robert Moran Compton, chief mate of the ship Harmonides, now lying in the graving dock, Liverpool, undergoing repairs, fell from the gangway into the bottom of the graving dock, and was so seriously injured that it was found necessary to remove him to the Northern Hospital. His injuries were so severe that he died ion the lith of January. would authout hear yourd

The deceased was a young man of much promise, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him for his industrious and temperate habits, and his kindly disposition. He professed experimental religion when quite young, at St. Martins, and joined the Baptist church in that place. His letters to his friends during his absence from home all breathed the purest affection for them, and the most ardent desire to live in accordance with the will of his Saviour. He was called suddenly to exchange time for eternity, but there is reason to believe from the spirit and language of his own letters, and from the testimony of his associates, that he was prepared to meet his God in peace. Deeply do we sympathize with his bereaved father and the other members of his household, and pray God to spread abroad in their hearts the comforts of his love.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY .- Mr. Sanford M. Fleming has recommended the route from Lake Temis-couta through the middle of New Brunswick, as the best. The routes hitherto proposed are Major Robinson's along the southern shore of the St. Liwrence, and that by way of Metapedia, on the southern frontier. Mr. Sandford Fleming's route is between these two—Quebec Mercury.

We may say that the middle route, as surveyed by Mr. Fleming last summer is through the Tobique mountains to the head waters of the Miramichi There are then two lines diverging from that point, both of which he surveyed, - one line through Boiestown to Apohaqui station,-the other down the Keswick Valley to Fredericton, meeting the survey of the Western Extension there. - Telegraph.

ELECTION IN WESTMORLAND. -A correspondent writing from Westmorland says: "The Anti Confederation ticket for this County is at last completed, and is understood to be as follows: A. J. Smith, Bliss Botsford, Amand Landry, and W. J. Gilbert. Rumor says that the Antis not being able to prevail on Doctor Wilson, a good old gentleman of Dorchester, to run on the ticket, have, as a dernier resort, added the name of Mr. Gilbert. - Telegraph.

H. M. S. Bombay was destroyed by fire at Monte Video on the 14th Dec. About ninety-three persons

The English Mail brings the sad intelligence of the death of Rev. H. B. Nicholls. He was a native of this Province, and a minister of the Church of England. About two and a half years ago he left New Mission in China, to which course he was impelled by the most praiseworthy and pious motives. Arriving in England he was diverted form his original labours. He died at Maulmain, Farther India, in the 33d year of his age—the melancholy event taking place about two weeks after his marriage. We deeply sympathize with his afflicted relations and friends. -Telegraph.

UNITED STATES.

It is gratifying to all the friends of social and civil liberty to know that on Tuesday, January 31, 1865, the House of Representatives, by the decisive vote of 119 to 56, adopted the joint resolution of the Senate abolishing Slavery forever in all the States and Territories of the Republic.

An important case has recently been decided before Judge Leonard, of the Supreme Court of the State of New York. A man named Millspaugh sued Seth Adams for damages, because he seduced the wife of the former, and obtaining for her a divorce in Indiana, married her. The jury gave \$10,000 damages to the plaintiff, and Judge Leonard, who has had much experience in such cases, and had several times before explained the law of matrimony and divorce, expressed himself satisfied with the verdict.

A RUN OF SUICIDES.

The New York Examiner says, three cases of suicide, in quick succession, have startled our city within a fortnight. The first was that of Mr. Melvin Whitney, a wealthy wine merchant-a man in the prime of life and prosperity; the second was that of Mr. Henry W. M. Meade, a photographer of much repute; the third was that of Mr. Samuel Dick, a retired merchant, supposed to be opulent. The cases were remarkably different in almost every particular. Mr. Whitney cut his throat in his bathing room, Mr. Meade took poison at Tammany Hall, and Mr. Dick hung himself in his own garret. The first induced his wife, or reputed wife, to rise before him, and committed the act while she was at breakfast; the second took a room at Tammany Hall, and after writing affectionate letters to his wife, children, father and friends, swallowed four ounces of laudanum; the third bade his wife good-bye kindly, and was supposed to go out, she saying, "God bless you," but was found the next day at noon, his wife having sat up all night for him, hanging dead in the garret. Mr. Whitney was about fifty years of age, a man of much physical strength, of temperate personal habits, and the last to be suspected of mental troubles or abborration. Mr. Meade was forty-two, seems to have had a morbidly sensitive temperament, and to have been addicted to drinking. He says in one of his letters, "I trust my sad fate will be a warning to those who indulge in liquors, and make them reform -it is the curse of the country." Mr. Dick was seventy years of age, and is said to have been much respected by his friends, and to have been happy in

An intelligent gentleman of Madison county, who recently visited Richmond, states that he conversed with Government officers, who told him that the holding of Richmond for any considerable time was despaired of by Davis and Lee, and that the public archives not necessary for immediate use are being sent into the interior of the South. Hundreds of families have removed to North Carolina and Georgia on a hint from officials. The whole city is said to be in process of mining, and Davis is determined that Richmond shall not fail into our hands except as a
