ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

Intense interest is felt in the progress of the "Great Eastern" as she proceeds on her Atlantic journey, laying a highway deep down on old ocean's bed, the home of the finny tribes, which have long held supreme dominion in all the regions of these watery depths. This ocean track, so far below the sphere of human life, is to be employed in the interchange of thought, as upon the lightning's wing, between the people of the two hemispheres, and for the purpose of carrying forward the great interests of scientific, commercial, and religious developement upon a new scale of magnificent proportions.

The treasures of modern science, of the most matured skill, and of mammoth wealth, have all been made tributary to the achievement of this mighty enterprise. If success crown the wondrous effort, the dial of the world's progress will henceforth move forward with a momentum which defies the power of human conception. We are expecting every hour to hear from the "Great Eastern" at Newfoundland. In the mean time we furnish the latest intelligence of

The shore end of the Atlantic cable having been successfully submerged on the night of the 22nd, the splice with the main cable was completed at 4.25 on Sunday afternoon, 23d, and the Great Eastern commenced paying out. The testing through the whole length was perfect, and the weather was very fine. On the 24th defects of insulation were discovered and the Great Eastern was hove to in lat. 52, long. 10, about eighty miles from the shore. The latest despatch is as follows :-

VALENTIA, July 25, 1865 .- The Great Eastern telegraphs from lat. 52, long. 12, that a small fault in the cable has been discovered and cut out. She is now paying out again, and signalling is perfect. Weather very fine.

A telegram from Valencia, dated the 24th of July, says :- " Insulation defects took place on Monday afternoon. The mischief is supposed to exist three miles west of the shore end splice, and it is believed that it was caused by too much strain from the Great Eastern. She hove to ten miles from the shore. The Caroline is picking up and under-running the splice and repairing the fault. It is expected that the damage will be rectified immediately. The rest of the cable remains perfect.

The defecture having been cut out, and the damage repaired the work went forward, and the dispatch from Queenstown per steamship City of Boston, dated July 27, states that the steamship Great Eastern was on that afternoon three hundred miles out at sea, paying out the cable successfully. The signals were good and the weather fine.

A private note from Cyrus W. Field says: "We expect to reach Heart's Content, Newfoundland, about the 5th of August." The following dispatches from on board the "Great Eastern" to Mr. Sayward of London are of interest :

" Tuesday, 11 P. M. One hundred and fifty miles of cable laid." " Midnight. One hundred and fifty miles run." " Wednesday, 6 A. N. Two hundred miles cable

laid. Signals good and all going on well." The correspondent of the London Times on board the "Great Eastern" says that she was unable to make more than five knots an hour against the tide in going down to Valentia, owing to her extreme weight on her sea voyage proper-estimated at over 700 tons daily—will considerably increase her speed till she arrives at Newfoundland. But taking her low rate at first with the uncertain date of her starting, it is evident that several days yet must elapse before news of her arrival can be looked for.

CHOLERA IN EGYPT .- The outbreak of the cholera in Egypt is attributed, first, to the tardy rise of the Nile, and this in turn to the heat having been insufficient to melt the snow on the mountains of Upper Egypt. The consequent stagnation of the Mahmoudie Canal—that branch of the Nile—which has caused wholesale death along its banks, and in the very harbor of Alexandria, which is always crowded with shipping for the Arabs drink, perform their ablutions in and make every conceivable use of the water of the canal.
