----ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

SIR MORTON PETO AT HOME.

Morton Peto made a speech on the 13th the anniversary of a charitable society at Bristol. We quote some passages from the Times. Speaking of

He went there at a most interesting epoch of the history of America—at the close of the most tremendous struggle known in modern times. He did expect to find exhaustion, and society somewhat disarranged; but he saw nothing of the kind. (Cheers.) There was nothing throughout the whole of the great country that would have led him to suppose that such a struggle had existed. Sir Morton entered into sta-tistics which showed the rapid growth and develop-ment of some parts of the United States, and also alluded to the vast growth of Boston and New York. To understand America, he said, they should go there, and no man of business entering life should consider his education complete until he had paid that country a visit. The war was from the very first

a war of principle.

The United States army was 1,200,000 strong, and General Grant had told him at St. Louis he had mustered 875,000 men, up to that day. He stated that he did not mean to have more than 50,000 men, and if their friends of the South were sincere they would bring the army down to 80,000. (Cheers.) If these men could go and be absorbed in civil life, it must show that the country possessed resources such as were never seen before, and which nations in Europe would do well to intimate. (Loud cheers.) Sir Morton went on to give an instance of how the soldiers were absorbed into civil callings, and he said that in Chicago he went over a large printing establishment belonging to a gentleman who was for some years a secretary of the Embassy in London. Talking to him tenant-that a sergeant;' but they were all at work as quietly as if they had never left the compositor's desk."

He had had the pleasure of meeting General M'Cullum, who had conducted the whole of the Commissariat Department, and who would be his guest next year, and he hoped to bring him to see the Bristol papels.
