On the 15th inst., after a long and painful illness, Jacob T., eldest sou of William H. Brown, aged 19 years and 8 nonths. Mrs. Margaret R. The excitement in favor of an emigration to Mexico, which was so prominent in the Atlantic cities and in San Francisco a month ago, seems to have quite died out.

A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY IN ROXBURY.

The Boston Journal, of Monday last, tells the fol-

lowing heart-rending tale :

One of the most terrible and revolting crimes which has ever occurred in New England was revealed in Roxbury late yesterday afternoon. It is one of those horrible double tragedies which sickens the human heart and makes the blood boil with a voluntary desire to inflict summary vengeance upon the inhuman and fiendish perpetrators. It will be recollected, as stated in the papers of last week, that on Monday last two children—brother and sister—named John S. Joyce and Isabella Joyce, left their mother's house to walk out to Roxbury. Since that time every ef-fort, until yesterday, to learn of their whereabouts, had been unsuccessful.

The mystery was solved yesterday, however, by the discovery of their lifeless bodies, bearing unmistaka-ble evidences of a terrible outrage and murder.
