The great Hero of the War-the indomitable and invincible Lieut, Gen. U. S. Grant-arrived in this city Saturday afternoon. The occasion excited the greatest enthusiasm, and the popular joy broke out in various demonstrations of delight. The arrival of the distinguished hero of so many magnificently fought battles was almost as great a surprise to our citizens as some of his movemenes during the past four years were to the enemy. There probably was no particular design in this. The General while holding a proper esteem for the opinions of the public, and while appreciating the honors that are sure to be showered upon him everywhere, does not seek to be lionized; and therefore is making his journey over New England without preliminiary announcements. Nevertheless the authorities of our State and city feel that the visit of so distinguished a man should not pass without some little outward demonstrations, though much more would be done were his tarry in Boston to be prolonged beyond a mere passage through, as it were. OTORRHŒA, OR DISCHARGES FROM THE EAR. BY A. P. LGHTHILL M. D.

Discharge from the Ear does not constitute a disease but is the sequel of disease of either the External or Middle Ear.
