ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The Burning of H. M. S. Bombay, at Montevideo, and the successful exertions of Capt. Troop, in saving the officers and men.

The Illustrated London News, of the 25th January. contains a beautiful engraving of this magnificent ship, and furnishes the following melancholy account of her destruction by fire:-

A despatch from Admiral Elliot and several officers' private letters give us fuller accounts of the destruction of the "Bombay," late the Admiral's flagship, which was burnt off Montevideo, with the loss of nearly a hundred lives, on the 13th of December. The Admiral had removed on board another ship that very morning, and the Bombay came out of port and put to sea for target practice. She was about fourteen miles away, when a man handing shells in the shellroom perceived a little jet of steam coming up from the after hold, and immediately gave the slarm. This was between two and three o'clock. The pumps were instantly set to work, and all worked well. The spirit-room took fire, the casks burst, and the spirits ran all over the ship, which became one mass of flame. The order was given to lower the boats and escape. Some boats could not be lowered, from the tackle being on fire. However, most of them were got out, but had to be kept at a good distance from the ship on account of the fire; therefore, all had to jump into the water and swim off to reach the boats. All the officers could swim more or less; many of the men could not, which accounts for the great loss of life among them. Lieut. Stirling was an hour and a balf in the water before he could be picked up. Many of the men clinging to bits of the ship were killed, it is believed by the cables falling down red-hot among them, and by the melted lead, of which there seems to have been a great deal in various parts of the ship. This melting lead pouring down on them made them loosen their hold of whatever they were holding by and go down. The great anchors, too, when their ropes were burned fell and crushed them. The mainmest went over at a quarter to four, only three quarters of an hour after the first alarm of fire By five o'clock all the survivors had gone away from the ship. The magazine blew up about seven o'clock, and the ship went down, leaving not a vestige behind. Not an article of any sort was saved but the clothes in which the officers and crew jumped into the sea, and most of them had thrown off jackets, to jump in and swim. The behaviour of the men was perfect all through, The origin of the fire is quite unaccounted for, The regulations about fire and matches were very strict; no petroleum or inflammable oils were used on board. He arrived in time to see her blow up. They got back to Montevideo about ten o'clock at night. Admiral Elliot had time only

to write a hurried despatch. From a private letter received by us by the last English mail from Captain A. G. Troop, master of the brig "Water Lily," owned by J. V. Troop & Son, of this city, dated Montevideo, Dec. 20th, 1864, we extract the following items regarding the important part he performed in rescuing a large number of immortal beings from a watery grave. In remarking upon the subject he says-" We picked up over two hundred officers and men belonging to the burning ship. As I saw her I crowded all sail, including studensails, and made for the place of disaster. I worked the 'Water Lily' round and round the burning ship, and picked up boat-load after boat-load of her living freight. Among them her captain, and about eighteen other officers, and some 184 petty officers and men, many of whom were in nature's clothing only. The captain came up one side with a boat's flag tied around his waist, and others with their legs stuck through their shirt sleeves. A good many were badly burned. We bound up their wounds, and provided them with such articles of clothing as we could muster, using shawls, capes, night-dresses, and in fact everything that would cover their nakedness; and a more thankful set of half-drowned, half-burned, distressed human beings I hope never to see again. So that, to use a Yankee phrase, I am "cleared out" A day or two ago the officers came on board in a body, headed by the commander, and tendered to Mrs. Troop and myself their hearty thanks, and assured us we should hear from them again, and from higher quarters. This morning the chaplain of the "Bombay" came on board, and presented Mrs. Troop with a beautiful fan, as a token of esteem." The following gratifying acknowledgments were

received by Captain Troop, and we feel very great pleasure in placing them upon permanent record.
