ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The daily papers, says the London Freeman, contained long accounts on Friday of the splendid and imposing ceremonial by which Dr. Manning, late of Oxford, was consecrated Archbishop of Westminster in the place of Cardinal Wiseman. The crowd was very great of persons of all creeds, and the sermon preached on the occasion appears to have been delivered in good English style by Dr. Amburst, Bishop of Northampton. The Daily News says that amongst the many priests who stood round the altar there were not less than a hundred who had either been in orders in the Church of England or had been fellows of English colleges. Dissenters, one would think, instead of injuring such universities, are rather needed as a counterpoise, if they could be so, to their anti-Protestant tendencies.

The Prince of Wales, who is, like his father, a Fishmonger, was entertained at a splendid banquet by his Company on Saturday. The Chancellor of the Exchequer represented her Majesty's Ministers, but of course avoided politics, though he gave a election. Lord Brougham, now in his eighty seventh in the venerable statesman's speech were an exhortation to the country not to disgrace itself by bribery in the eyes of foreign nations, in which he repeated his wish to make bribery felony-and an earnest exhortation to the people of America, -numbering himself with their best friends .- that "those who by great military skill, courage, and perseverance, had obtained a victory, would use their triumph so as to temper mercy with justice, and not stain their cause by shedding blood on the scaffold." The confession of the assassin Atzerott is published from which it appears that George Andrew Atzerott was born in the Kingdom of Prussia in 1835, and came to this country with his parents 1844. He arrived at Baltimore, in which place he resided with he moved to Westmoreland county, Virginia. His father farmed and carried on his business, that of a blacksmith, at the Court House. Atzerott was placed at the business of coach making. He remained at the Court House until 1856, when he went to Washington, and worked fordifferent employers as a coach painter. Surratt induced him to join in the conspiracy for abducting the President. Atzerott's knowledge of the men and the country in the vicinity of Port Tobacco, and, in fact, of all the counties bordering on the Potomac, gave to the conspirators a valuable assistant. He was well acquainted with Harrold, whom he was-not long in finding out, and who was also engaged in the conspiracy.

The first meeting of all the conspirators actually engaged was at a saloon on Pennsylvania avenue, called Geteer's. At this meeting O'Laughlin, Arnold, Booth, Surratt, Harrold and Atzerott were present. The first atempt to abduct the President was to be on the 7th street road. This was to be about the middle of March, when they expected the President to visit a camp. O'Laughlin, Aroold, Payne, Surratt, Booth and Atzerott were present. Harrold left with the buggy with the carbines for "T. B." The plan was to seize the coach of the President, Surratt to jump on the box, as he was considered the best driver, and make for "T. B" by way of Long Old-field's to the Potomac river, in the vicinity of Nar-gomey creek, where they had a boat waiting with men to carry over the party. The boat was capable of carrying fifteen men. It had been bought by Booth for the purpose, from two men named Branner and Smoot. This plan failed, the President not com-ing as they desired. Harrold went next morning to

The next plan was to visit the theatre on the night the President was expected to be there. It was arranged that Surratt and Booth were to go to the box. Arnold, O'Laughlin and Payne were to act some important part in getting them out. Harrold and At-zerott were to have charge of the horses, and an actor was to be secured to put out the gas. Booth re-presented that the best assistant he had was an actor. In this plan buggies and horses were to be used. A rope, which was to be prepared and be at Keyd's, was to be stretched across the road to impede the cavalry in the pursuit. The route at this time was to cavalry in the pursuit. The route at this time was to be the same as before, except that they were to cross the eastern branch bridge. This whole affair failed, and Booth said " It is all up," and spoke of going to Richmond and opening a theatre, and promised Atze-rott employment in it in some capacity. Atzerott was waiting for Booth to arrange his going to Richmond when the affair was renewed again. He had taken a room at the Kirkwood House.
