It is, as we have remarked above of other great facts, the legitimate offspring of our peculiar capabilities as

a new and boundlessly opulent country. This suggestion was first hinted some months since by an Eastern paper. It was not decried at the time; on the contrary, it was soberly allowed to pass along in the public journals; was pondered a little; talked about somewhat; found, after the usual amount of Yankee "calkelation," to be not impracticable, but deemed rather improbable; and seemed at last quietly adjourned till more immediate and stirring events should subside. Lately it has been revived by the New York Herald, and practically initiated by its editor taking two shares, amounting to forty thousand dollars.
