### ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

The Christian World of the 1st inst., furnishes the following interesting items :-

THE QUEEN AT COBURG. - The inauguration of the statue of the late Prince Consort, on the six-andfortieth anniversary of his birthday, took place at Coburg, the Prince's early home. In the centre of the town, at a spot chosen by the Queen, and at her sole charge, save so far as her elder children strove to join with her in the memorial offering, a statue of the Prince had been erected under the affectionate superintendence of his brother, the reigning Dake, and on Saturday, in the presence of his family, his kinsfolk, and his friends-those who had known him as a boy, or had lived and learnt with him in his studious youth, the Queen, the wife of his manhood, and the children who were to the last the objects of his tenderest solicitude and care-it was solemnly unveiled. For some days previously, the Queen, with her younger children, had been living at the Rosenau, the place of the Prince's birth, about four miles from Coburg; and full of the associations which haunts its secluded beauty, they came from it to the ceremonial. In the market place Her Majesty was met by her remaining children, the Prince with the Princess of Wales, the Princess Royal and the Princess Alice, with their husbands, and Prince Alfred, who had been staying with his uncle, the reigning Duke, since his own birthday, a few weeks since, when his majority was formally proclaimed, and his presumptive heirship to the Duchy was recognised. Thus, for the first time for many years, were assembled about the Queen all the children of Her Majesty and the Prince, and near this group stood his brother, cousins, more distant kinsmen, and friends, while all around were congregated the quiet Saxons, many of whom could remember his birth, his boyhood, and the day when he quitted them to take up his residence among a strange people. In the presence of this sympathetic multitude the statue was uncovered, with the accompaniment of choral song, and the pealing of bells, and the roar of cannon, and was then solemnly given in charge to the citizens of Coburg, to be preserved as a memorial of the talents and virtues which had been born among them. A FRENCH INVASION. - The French are really upon

us, and yet no alarm is felt in any part of the country 1 The squadron that has reached Spithead consists of nine large men-of-war and four smaller vessels. There was a great expenditure of powder when the French ships steamed into our waters, but no shot or shell. May the Imperial navy never come to us on a less peaceful mission. Vast numbers of people have flocked to Portsmouth to greet the Frenchmen; and our civil as well as naval authorities are intent upon making their visit one to be long remembered with pleasure. Several days are to be spent in costly festivities; and it will be well if all of them are so conducted that they can be looked back upon with unmingled satisfaction. That much good will feeling be produced between the people of the two countries by these international courtesies there can be no THE HARVEST.—The return of fine weather has

put a new face upon the prospects of the harvest, The corn crops will not prove a failure anywhere, and in some parts of the country there will seemingly be a good average yield. As a whole, however, it appears certain that the wheat crop is considerably deficient in quantity and the quality far from first-rate, But for the existence of a good deal of last year's wheat, the price would have risen much more than it has. Barely is almost uniformly reported to be a full average crop, and the yield of oats moderate. Beans, and peas, and pot toes do not greatly disappoint any of their growers. The pastures are, of course, extremely good, and beets and turnips have grown to a prodigious size. Upon the whole, therefore, people may find far more powerful reasons for gratitude than grumbling, and it is quite possible to see in the plenteousness of the food for cattle a providential means of moderating and checking the terrible scourge that might otherwise wholly desolate the

THE CATTLE PLAGUE.—The cattle plague has now appeared in many different parts of the kingdom, and is evidently spreading, but its progress is not yet so rapid or destructive as might have been feared. The Government is appointing paid inspectors to visit in fected districts, enforcing the adoption of the best measures for checking the advance of the malady. The highest rate of mortality is among the cows in the London diaries, and this is not surprising considering the unnatural manner in which those poor animals are penned up. Some years ago an articlewritten, strange to say, by a lady—appeared in a popular periodical, arguing that London cows were just as healthy and happy as if they had the green fields to roam in ; but the results of the murrain are likely to dispel any notions of this kind. In compliance with the request of the Irish agriculturists, who are naturally anxious to preserve their herds from contagiou, an order in Council has been issued prohibiting the importation of cattle from England or Scotland to Ireland. The Lord-Lieutenant is reported the other day to have estimated the total transportation into Ireland during the last twelve months from all ports, including those of Great Britain and of foreign countries, at about 7,000 head, while in the same period there were exported from Ireland into Great Britain more than 420,000 head. A malady, bearing a striking resemblance to the disease which is now causing such ravages among the cattle in England, has appeared in the Netherlands. It is currently reported there that the cattle returned thence as unsaleable. A Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians remarks: "Whether the disease was originally imported or not, it is perfectly clear that it has extended far and wide throughout the country, and that there is now far greatter risk of the exportation of English cattle carrying it into other countries than of the importation of foreign cattle causing an increase of it in our own. If it be permissible to compare the disease with any human malady, contagious typhus is the one which it most closely resembles. Now, the remedy which it most closely resembles. Now, the remedy the surpasses hill others, ooth in the pevention and in the treatment of human typhus and of allied diseases, is fresh air. With plenty of fresh air, in fact, human typhus almost ceases to be contagious. The same remedy will, I am confident, be found equally efficacious in preventing the spread and in diminishing the most slite of the article stage. the mortality of the cattle plague. Fumigation and dis-infectants may do some good, but they cannot supply the place of fresh air. If all the cattle in our metropocow-houses were at once removed to well-ventilated wooden sheds erected in open spaces in the neighbouring country, I believe that we would soon hear little more of the cattle plague."
