ed. It says, in obedience to orders he found himsel in the Arctic and Oksotsz Sea, far removed from the ordinary channels of commerce. In consequence of this awkward circumstance, he was engaged in acts of war till the 28th of June, entirely ignorant of the reverses suffered by the Confederates and the total obliteration of the Government under whose orders he acted. He received the first intelligence on the 2nd of August, from the British bark Barracouta. He desisted immediately from further acts of war, until he could communicate with some European port and learn if the intelligence was true. It would not have been sensible to have taken the ship into an American port merely on the statement of a British Captain. He diligently sought for precedent in lawwriters for guidance as to future control, manage-ment and final disposal of the vessel, but found none. Finding the authority under which he acted questionable, he immediately ceased cruising, and shaped his ourse for the Atlantic. He did not feel justified in destroying the vessel; but, on the contrary, he thought the ship should revert to the American Government. Therefore, he sought Liverpool to learn the news, and if without a Government, to surrender the ship, with guns, stores and apparel complete, to should deem proper.
