A FRIEND IN NEED. "Thine own friend, and thy father's friend, forsake not." -PROV. XXVII. 1.

There was not a happier mother in the villago than Mrs. Peters, nor a better son than her Robin. She had trained up her child in the way he should go, and it was now his delight to walk in it; she had not shrunk from correcting his faults, and he loved her the better for the correction ; she had taught him from the Bible his duty towards his God, and from the same pages he had learned his duty towards his mother. 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
