PRESIDENT LINCOLN'S INAUGURAL.

The inauguration of President Lincoln, on assuming his second term of office, took place on Saturday. Chief Justice Chase administered the oath of office. The following is Hs Excellency's inaugural address. FELLOW COUNTRYMEN :--At this second appearing to take the oath of the

Presidental office, there is less occasion for an extended address, than there was at the first. Then a statement somewhat in detail of a course to be pursued seemed very fitting and proper. Now at the expiration of four years, during which public declarations have constantly been called forth on every point and phase of the great contest which still absorbs the attention, and engrosses the energies of the nation, little that is new could be presented. The progress of our arms, upon which all else chiefly depends, is as well known to the public as to myself, and it is, I trust, reasonably satisfactory and encouraging to all. With high hope for the future, no prediction in regard to it is ventured. On the occasion corresponding to this, four years ago, all thoughts were anxiously directed to an impending civil war. All dreaded it: all sought to avoid it. While the Inaugural Address was being delivered from this place, devoted altogether to saving the Union without war, insurgent agents were in the city seeking to destroy it without war seeking to dissolve the Union, and divide the effects by negotiation. Both parties depre-

One-eighth, of the whole population were colored slaves -not distributed generally over the Union, but located in the Southern part of it. These slaves contributed a peculiar and powerful interest :- all knew that this interest was somehow the cause of the war. To strengthen, to perpetuate and extend this interest was the object for which the insurgents would rend the Union, by war, while Government claimed no right to do more than to restrict the territorial en-

than let the nation survive, and the other would

accept war rather than let it perish-and the war

Neither party expected the magnitude or the duration which it has already attained. Neither anticipated that the cause of the conflict might, cease even before the conflict itself should cease. Each looked for an easier triumph, and a result less fundamental and astounding. Both read the same Bible, and pray to the same God, and each invokes His aid against the other. It may seem strange that any man should dare to ask a just God's assistance in wringing their bread from the sweat of other men's faces. But let us judge not that we be not judged. The prayers of both should not be answered that of neither has been answered fully. The Almighty has His own purposes. "Woe unto the world because of offences. for it must needs be that offence come; but woe to that man by whom the offence cometh.

If we shall suppose that American slavery is one of these offences, which in the Providence of God must needs come, but which having continued through His appointed time, He now wills to remove, and that He gives to both North and South this terrible war, as the woe due to those by whom the offence came. shall we discern there is any departure from those divine attributes which the believers in the living God always ascribe to Him?

Fondly do we hope fervently do we pray, that this mighty scourge of God may speedily pass away. Yet if God wills that it continue until all the wealth, piled by the bondsmen's 250 years of unrequited toil shall be sunk, and until every drop of blood drawn with the sword as was said 3000 years ago, so still it must be said that the judgments of the Lord are true and righteous altogether.

With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphan; to do all which may acheive and cherish a just and a lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations.

THE FEELING IN THE CONQUERED CITIES SOUTH. [From the Scottish American Journal.]

Enough has already been shown of the deceitful appearances which have at first attended the capture of Southern cities by the Federal army, to teach us not to place much reliance on the earliest reports. On the entrance of General Sherman's troops into Savannah, we were assured, in most positive and cir-cumstantial terms, that the people "hailed the sight of the old flag with joy," and many assumed facts were presented to illustrate this patriotic state of things. A great meeting was held, for instance, under the presidency of the Mayor, and enthusiastic speeches, accompanied by "loyal" resolutions, were he order of the day. Many other corroborative proofs were offered to show how eager the Savannah people were to get back into the Union.

Only a few weeks elapse, however, when all this is changed. Sober accounts of the actual state of things, written by thoughtful and observant men, show that the demonstrative loyalty which met the eye on the first entrance of the Federal troops into the city, gradually subsided, first into a callous indifference, and next into a sullen and malignant feeling of ill-concealed harred. And that is now the prevailing

feeling and expression in Savannah to-day.

The accounts received during the current week respecting Charleston and Wilmington are as highly. colored as the first reports from Savannah, and, we think, are just as likely to prove in the end fallarious. As regards Charleston, only the poorest of the inhabitants remained behind to bear testimony to their revived love for the old union. All that could along with the Confederate troops, or took an inde-pendent course towards the interior of the state. Propendent course towards the interior of the state. Pro-bably many of the remaining citizens were of that class that had no special interest in the rebellion, or in its authors—being too poor to own slaves, and of too fittle account in the political scle to care what form of government they lived under. We can readily believe that this class—with the prospect before believe that this class—with the prospect before them of getting something to eat—really did cheer for "the old tlag" and its fipholders. But we think it advisable to be on our guard against all the rose-colored stories of reviving loyalty in the South. The people there who have any prosperity are doubtless all at heart Secessionists, and have less love for "the old flag" than they have for that of France. We abould think it strange, indeed, if it were otherwise.
