That gives us special voice in their case. If the Maritime Provinces seriously intend to adhere to the British Crown, it is impossible to say what fleets, what garrisons, what iron-clads, what ordinance we shall have to pour into Halifax and the other ports, all at our cost. Having, then, an additional right to speak in this case, we venture to say that if Nova Scotia and New Brunswick seriously intend to be loval, they ought to act accordingly, and declare for Confederation. Their holding off their decision for the present, and see which way the wind blows. In the hour of actual resistance there must be Union, and that Union will be all the more easy and effectual for some previous use. Indeed, the matter is so plain, that vacillation on this point can only be interpreted as wavering loyalty. The reasons that have been given against a Confederation, even in the cold form of a Zoliverein, are of the most mercantile character. The trade of the Maritime Provinces, it is said, naturally runs to New England and the populous Northern States. It is here that they sell their coal and other commodities. This, of course, is an equal reason for giving up our allegiance altogether; and if the Legislatures of these Provin ces cannot make up their minds to forego for our sake some of their commercial advantages, it is better that they should speak out more plainly at once. It is most important that we should know whether our Provinces will fight for their allegiance. If they will not take the requisite steps now, we cannot expect them to do more in the very hour of approaching conflict, when the result of an honourable decision will be no longer problematical.

It cannot be necessary to remind any of our fellow subjects on the American Continent that if they are invaded, no submission, no trimming policy, no middle course will deter their new masters from pushing the rights of conquest to the utmost. The Government of Washington may, for aught we know, charge upon England all the costs of the war, on the argument-if argument be necessary-that the terrible dissensions and sacrifices of the war are owing to the course we have taken. It has been repeatedly proposed to discharge the cost of the war out of the land and other property of the rebels themselves, and by the same reason, supposing us to share the crime and the fate of the rebels, the whole soil and proper ty of British America may be confiscated and sold to satisfy the holders of Federal paper. Imagination itself cannot picture the condition of those Provinces. with all the interesting varieties of race, handed over to administrators selected for the very purpose of stamping out every vestige of British feeling and making their alienation an insult to this country. But is it indeed necessary to warn any British subject of his certain fate if he gives up his fields, his altars, and his nearths into the hands of misters tresh from the decimation of their own people? Does anybody there think it possible to purchase by compromise the equality of citizens, and to get off with even a moderate contribution to the costs of the war? The Americans, we all see, can be true enough to their rulers so long as the interests of the struggle no check to their cupidity, their triumph, or their revenge. Once in possession of British soil, " Væ victis ?" will be the cry, and neither President Lincoln nor any other President will be able to prevent it. Independence is the only hope of the Colonist; independence in its present form, or, if it must be at some distant day, formal, literal, and absolute self-government. - For the present there is only one question, and only one way of answering it-Confederation, or not!

ITALY .- Turin, March 14 .- By a larger majority than had been anticipated, the Chamber of Deputies, after an eight hours' sitting, yesterday voted the abolition of capital punishment for all crimes for which it has hitherto been inflicted by the ordinary penal code. On the seventh day of this discussion, Gen eral della Marmora made a long speech, and Signor Vacca, Minister of Grace and Justice, also addressed the House. Their enemies say that they rather lost votes than gained them. It is certain that every body has been surprised by the division. The most sanguine partisans of abolition hardly dared to reckon on a majority of 3 to 2, but the division showed 150 against 91. Tuere is no doubt that the Senate will reverse the decision of the Deputies in this matter. It is presumable that those who voted for doing away with capital punishment in Italy did so upon principle, and because they believe milder punishments to be at least equally effective in deterring from crime, and that they did not thus vote upon the ground that Italy is so far advanced in civilization and virtue that she can afford to abrogate the penalty of death better than other nations. General della Marmora, aithough his speech does not seem much approved as a whole, yesterday uttered some home truths on this and other

SPAIN AND PERU. - According to the latest accounts from Peru, dated February 13, the Chincha Islands have been restored by the Spaniards to the Peruvian authorities, and the terms agreed upon between the two Governments for the settlement of their differences have been carried into effect. There is, however, much excitement in the country, and several members of Congress and others have been arrested

by the Peruvian Government,

On the 5th of February there were serious riots at Lima and at Callao. The boats of the Spanish ships of war were pelted with stones, and one seaman on shore was murdered. The Spanish officers who were in Lima were obliged to take reluge in the escorted by a troop of cavalry, brought them down to Callao, where they were embarked in the Peruvian men-of-war boats and taken off to their ships. They

are all now kept on board ship.

Admiral Parejas complained to the Peruvian authorities of these proceedings, and the latendente of Callao and the General in command of the garrison have both been dismissed. But it was not yet considered safe for the Spanish officers to go on shore. The Peruvian Admiral, Valleriestra, will proceed as Minister to Spain by the next packet.

THE SEAT OF WAR

THE FALL OF RICHMOND. The doomed city has fallen at last. Through the enterprise of the Globe the startling news reached us on Monday last, This is a fearful blow to rebeldom, and has filled the North, as might be expected, with the most rapturous rejoicings. Four long and bloody years have passed since the cry from the North went forth loud and earnest, "On to Richmond." Embattled legions, led by the bravest generals which the Washington Administration could command, repeatedly hastened forward in obedience to that cry; but were as often driven back with awful slaughter by Lee's invincible forces. But after the tremendous failures of M'Clellan, Burnside, Meade, and others, General Grant, the hero of Vicksburg, vas called to the command of the army of the otomac. On Wednesday the 4th of May, 1864, the now, ederal forces under Grant crossed the Rapidan at four fords, viz., Jacobs, Culpepper Germanin Milts, and United States. Lee accepted battle. The conict went forward through Thursday and Friday with wful devastation on both sides. The bloody battles f the "wilderness" which followed in rapid suc-, were duly reported at the time in the Visitor, ad are fresh in the minds of many of our readers. period tens of thousands of brave fellows have fallen to rise not until the resurrection trump shall summon the dead to awake and come to judgment. But of all attack of the foe, are just those which would most the battles fought by these veteran forces, probably the last have been the most terrific. It was a life and death struggle; but the valour, skill, and indomitable energy of Lee's veterans had to yield to the superior numbers and combined forces of the determined Grant and his subordinates. The result is that Lee has been compelled not to surrender, but to evacuate Richmond and Petersburg, and to retreat to some other stronghold. It is just possible that he can only be ascribed to a lurking wish to reserve and his whole army may be captured; and if so the war must end, but if not, he may fall back upon Eastern Tennessee, and amid the monntain fastnesses of that vast region continue the war to an indefinite period. We shall not get the full particulars of this mighty movement until next week, but through the kindness of "Turner's Express" we have Boston papers of Monday, and from them we present our readers with the details as far as reported to that

The Boston Journal of Monday, April 3, thus speaks :-

Washington, Sunday, April 2, 1865. The following dispatch has been received from The Journal's correspondent "Mystic," dated on Friday,

the 31st ult. : "Although it was not thought yesterday that the rebels would make any determined resistance to our troops until they reached the defences of the Southside Railroad, to-day has witnessed an earnest attempt to contest the advance, which was at one time partially successful. But the valor of our troops triumphed and Gen. Grant has the satisfaction of seeing that his plans have been carried out. The headquarters are located to-night at a place known as Dabrey Mills. and during the day he has been swinging around somewhat on the left, the right being the pivot and now facing Petersburg, which may be regarded as a doomed city.

Gen. Sherman has been doing his share of the work, though we do not know what he has accomplished. Some of his wounded who have reached the field hospitals of the Second corps, are sanguine he will reach the Southside Railroad, and if he does this great artery of rebellife will be secured. Gen. Lee will then have to fight, run or surrender.

The operations of to-day were made by the 5th, the 24 and a portion of the 23th corps, under the direction of Gen. Meade, although Gen. Grant was on horseback all day, personally acquainting himself with what was transpiring.

The movement was commenced early this, Friday, morning, on the extreme left, by the Fifth corps, which rendezvoused at the Butler House, on the direct road from Petersburg to Dinwiddie Court House. Here the corps was massed by divisions in three lines for the advance. General Ayers' second division was in front, then came General Crawford's 3d division, and last Gen. Griffith's 1st division. The advance was commenced at about 8 o'clock, the objective point being what is known as the White Oak road. This require a show of confidence and a continuity of road branches from the Boydtown road, about seven management. But we see also that they will bear miles from Petersburg, and strikes the Southside Railroad at Sutherland station. It is nearly parallel with Hatcher's Run and and about one mile from it. The country over which the 5th corps had to pass, to swing around to White Oak road, was broken and cut up with ravines, and somewhat wooded. In the pieces of woodland the rebel skirmisher kept up a fire on the advancing column, but feel back, with occasional skirmishes, till Gen. Ayres' division had moved forward nearly two miles. At that point the reneis rallied in torce, and after a brief struggle Gens. Ayres and Crawford's divisions were forced to fall back. Gen. Griffith, finding the advance had been changed into a retreat, assumed the defensive, and Bartlett's brigade of his corps threw up a slight breast-work on a rise of ground where the corps was rallied. When the advance was resumed the brigades of Gens. Chamberlain and Gregory were placed in front, leaving Bartlett's brigade as a reserve. The divisions of Gens. Ayres and Crawford followed. Every officer and man determined to show the rebels that the discomfiture was only temporary. For a time the rebels, with shouts and yells, disputed the advance, but 'the fighting fifth' had 'it's back up' and drove the enemy before them into some defences hastily thrown up for the protection of the coveted White Oak road. Here a stand was made, but Chamberlain's brigade carried the works in gallant style, taking a battle flag and some prisoners.

By half past three the 5th corps rested on White Oak road, having nobly redeemed and sustained its reputation. Its casualties all told will amount to nearly one thousand. The 2d corps, under Gen. Humphreys, also advanced and swung round with the 5th corps, which was on its left.

A dispatch has just been received showing that Sheridan, aided by Warren, had at 2 P. M. pushed the enemy back so as to retake the Five Forks, and bring his own headquarters up to 'F. Boysseaus. The Five Forks were barricaded by the enemy and carried by Deven's division of cavalry. This part of the enemy's force seems to be now trying to work along the White Oak road to join the No. 2 main force in front of Grant, while Sheridan and Wa, ren are pressing them as closely as possible.

This morning Gen. Grant, having ordered an attack along the whole line, telegraphs as follows:

" Both Wright and Parke have got through the enemy's lines. The battle now rages furiously. Gen. Sheridan, with his cavalry, the 5th corps, and Miles' division of the 8d corps, which was sent to him since one o'clock this morning, is now sweeping down from the west. All now looks highly favorable. Gen. Ord is engaged, but I have not yet heard the result in his front.

City Point, Va., April 2-11 A. M. Dispatches are frequently coming in; all going finely. Parke, Wright and Ord, extending from the Appointation to Hatcher's Run, have all broken through the enemy's entrenched line, taken some forts, guns and prisoners. Sheridan, with his own cavalry, and the 5th corps and a part of the 24 corps is coming in from the west on the enemy's flank, and Wright is already tearing up the South side Rail-A. LINCOLN.

City Point, Va., April 2-2 P. M. At 10.45 A. M. Gen. Grant telegraphs as follows "Everything has been carried from the left of the 3000 prisoners. The 2d a d 25th corps captured forts, guns and prisoners from the enemy, but I can not tell the number. We are now closing around the works of the line immediately enveloping Petersburg. All looks remarkably well. I have not yet heard from Sheridan. His headquarters have been moved up to Banks' House, near the Boydtewn road, about three miles south-west of Petersburg." A. Lincoln."

City Point, Va., April 2-8.30 P. M. At 4.30 P. M. to-day General Grant telegraphs as follows:-" We are now up and have a continuous line of troops, and in a few hours will be intrenched from the Appointation below Petersburg to the river above. The whole captures since the army started out will not amount to less than 12,000 men and probably fifty pieces of artillery. I do not know the number of men and guns accurately, however. A portion of Foster's division, 24th corps made a most gallant charge this afternoon and captured a very important fort from the enemy with its entire garrison.
