EXTENSIVE FIRE IN QUEBEC. - Shortly before one o'clock on the morning of March 25th, flames were discovered bursting from the lower story of that part of the Quebec seminary building immediately front-ting the Laval University, and known as the new wing. APPALLING CALAMITY AT SEA!-The New York Tribune contains an account of one of the most appalling calamities by fire at sea that has occurred for many years, involving the loss of life of some 521 souls, including men, women and children, nearly four-fifths of whom were burned to death, owing to the dastardly conduct of some few who were on board the ship and had no thought but for self-preservation.

On Wednesday last the United States steam transport Gen. Lyon sailed from Wilmington for Fortress force, having on board 204 of the 6th Illinois Regiment, Third division, Second Brigade, Fifteenth Army corps, who had served out their time, about two hundred paroled and escaped prisoners, and a considerable number of refugees, making a total, including the crew, of about 550 persons. Mothing of interest occurred until about 10 o'clock on Friday morning, when in shoal water off Cape Hatteras, the thrilling cry of fire was raised and at once the scene was heart-rending. Women ran screaming on the decks searching for their children or friends, while men were quite as appalled or frantic, and, in the language of one of the aurylors, it seemed as if every one had suddenly become bereft of their senses, and the place was a tery—pandemoration. Soldings who had been with

Sherman through all his hard-fought battles, and had never been known to falter in the thickest of battle, became as helpless as little children.

The fire was caused by the bursting of a harrel of coal oil in the porter's room, directly over the boiler, and in less than five minutes the flames were belching out on deck, and with the assistance of a strong gale, spread very rapidly. The mate of the ship at once went to get out the hose, but the alarm and excitement were so great that but little progress could be made towards extinguishing the fire. In the meantime the captain of the ship came up, and in the most frantic manner exclaimed, "she's gone! she's gone! there's no use trying to save her!" A rush was then made for the life-boats, of which there were but three on board, and they were soon launched. Two of the boats were on the bow of the vessel, and as soon as one was launched, the captain sprang into t, and pushed off, intent on saving his own life. -Capt. James Weber, of Co. K. 56th Illinois regiment succeeded in getting into the same boat, which in a moment after was struck by the wheel, and the captain of the ship was instantly killed. Captain Weber, being uninjured, clung to the swamped boat, but subsequently, as he was being hauled on board the Gen. Sedgwick, about a quarter of a mile distant, lost his hold of the rope and was drowned. Our informant, Joseph Fitzgerald, Co. K. 56th Illinois, got into the other boat launched from the bow, together with twelve others, and while endeavoring to get on board the Sedgwick all but five were drowned, in consequence of the rough sea. A number of other persons got into the third launch and were saved, while others tossed overboard doors and planks, and were subsequently picked up.

At the time the fire broke out nearly 400 soldiers were below, as but a few were allowed on deck at one time; and as soon as the alarm was given, the ladders were pulled up from the hatches thus precluding the possibility of escape, and there can be no doubt that they were burned to death. Those remaining on deck jumped overboard and were drowned. The whole number known to have been saved was 29, of whom were 20 were soldiers, and nine of the crew of the ship. Of the 204 of the 56th Illinois Regiment, all but four perished, including all the officers.

In three hours from the time the fire broke out the ship was entirely destroyed. The Gen. Sedgwick lay by until toward night, and then left, the officers and crew having done everything in their power toward rescuing the unfortunate beings of the Lyon, but were unable to do more than they did, in consequence of the rough and the close proximity to the breakers. ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

ARRIVAL OF THE " OHINA."

NEW YORK, April 7. The Royal Mail Steamship China, from Liverpool 26th, via Queenstown 26th, ult., arrived at this port at 8 o'clock this morning.

Captain Anderson, of the China, has been appointed to the command of the Steamship Great Eastern, during the laying of the Atlantic Cable, and will sail from Valencia, Ireland, about the first of July. The British Admiralty have agreed to order two powerful steamers of the Navy to accompany the Great Eastern.

In the house of Lords Earl Russell laid on the table a notification from Minister Adams of the intention of the American Government to terminate the treaty and convention regulating armed forces on the lakes. Said treaty would terminate twelve months from day of the receipt of the notice was ted on the lakes fully justified the steps taken. Lord Palmerston denied there was any danger of war with America. The relations were friendly. The Government simply proceeded according to practice of all countries. The amendment was rejected to 275 to 40. Sir Frederick Bruce is a passenger on

In the House of Commons last night, Mr. Aytoun asked if the Government intended to ask the sanction of Parliament to guarantee the money required to complete the railway from Halifax to Quebec. Mr. Cardwell said when the Colony was prepared to carry into effect the conditions upon which the guarantee was to be given, the Government would be prepared to fulfil their engagements, but as at present

the guarantee at this session. On the 27th ult., Lord R. Cecial asked if the Government intended to leave to the British American colonies full discretion as to whether they would or would not join in the proposed confederation, or whether they intended to ask Parliament for com-

pulsory powers? "Mr. Cardwell said that all the intentions of Government had been already stated. They had expressed their entire approval of the scheme, and their lope and trust that it would be adopted by the

colonial legislature; but they had no idea of obtaining compulsory powers." Among the papers laid before Parliament by Russell is a letter from Minister Adams, in which he merely endorses the resolutions of the U.S. Congress for the termination of the reciprocity treaty and notifies that it will terminate at the expiration of 12 months; and Russeli's acknowledgement in which he says Her Majesty will instruct Sir Frederick Bruce on his proceeding to Washington.
