Spirits will be strictly prohibited entrance to the camp, but a canteen under proper control will be established at which beer, tobacco, and other things likely to be wanted by the men, will be sold. There is every probability that the requisite number of volunteers will be forthcoming. - Globe. -



the armies are breaking up and rapidly dispersing to their homes. The Western troops were mostly sent off first, and the Eastern ones will follow speedily. The various commanders have issued farewell addresses to their troops, of various degrees of eloquence. General Sherman arrived in New York Thursday morning, on his way to Cincinatti, where his future headquarters will be. General Grant attended a meeting at Cooper Institute, New York, Wednesday evening. The enthusiasm with which these two Generals have been received shows how well their great services are appreciated.

Davis will be tried before the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. The fear that no jury could be found to try him because there is no intelligent person who has not expressed an opinion concerning the war, and Davis himself, does not hold good in the District of Columbia. There the practice has been to ask the juror whether he can or not try the case and render a verdict under the law as given by the Court, and upon the testimony as proven upon the trial, irrespective of any previously formed opinion. If he answers in the affirmative, he is directed to take a seat upon the jury. What defence Davis will adopt, of course is not known. But he is to be tried for treason, and it is said to be a fact that there is no punishment in the United States laws for that crime. The Constitution says that Congress shall declare a punishment, which it has never done, there never having been a case of treason in our history. If this is true, Davis may eatch at it to save himself, but we do not see how he can do more than prolong his miserable life till Congress shall meet and pronounce his doom. A large naval force is to be sent to European waters, to show the friends abroad some of the craft that have been distinguished in the war.

THE CHOPS WEST. - A letter from Indianapolis says : -From all parts of the State we have the most flattering prospects for a large and remunerative crop the coming autumn, notwithstanding the late cold, wetweather, which has materially retarded the spring work. The frost of last month have somewhat damaged the grape-vines, though not seriously. Winter wheat looks healthy ; the hay crops will be abundant, and fruit of every description looks prosperous.

BOSTON, June 13. A Washington despatch says Fort McHenry has been cleared of all prisoners of every kind, the political prisoners being pardoned.

A vessel has arrived here from Morehead City, N. C., and reports great suffering among the people of the Eastern portion of that State.

Several ex rebel Congressmen from Virginia have notified Governor Pierpout of their determination to support him. Judge Underwood, of the Eastern Section of Vir-

ginia, is in Washington in consultation with the Attorney General with regard to the indictment of Lee. Corse, Ewell, Longstreet, ex-Governors Smith and Letcher, and others, for treason.

Attorney General Speed has issued a circular relating to special applications for pardon under the Am-nesty Proclamation, directing that all applicants must be accompanied by the original oath prescribed in the President's proclamation, as taken or subscribed by the applicant before an officer competent to administer such oath.

It is rumored that John Mitchell has also been indicted for treason.

A tremendous explosion of loose powder and fixed ammunition took place in Chattanooga, 10th inst, destroying property valued at a quarter of a million of dollars.
