The Roman Archbishop Cullen, of Dublin, in pastoral recently issued, faithfully warns his people against the Fenian delusion. He says that "every truth must fully understand that Fenianism is not. indeed, a dangerous or powerful, but, indeed a foolish and wicked conspiracy against the existing civil authorities, and still more against the divinely constituted authority of the Church of God. Its effects have been most injurious to the country, turning away the minds of the people from their legitimate occupations to wicked, wild, and impracticable projects, disturbing the course of trade, interrupting business, and giving a pretext to the Orange lodges to arm all their members, and even reckless boys, to the great risk of the public peace, and to excite a bitter persecution against poor Catholics who had no connection whatever with Fenians or their follies.

In the United States this latest political heresy is in full blast. O'Mahony, Roberts, and Sweeny harangue the people in the following style. General Sweeny, at one of their public meetings, declared that his plan was to make a warlike demonstration on Ireland by way of Canada.

Roberts, at the same meeting, said :-

General Sweeny has made contracts for materials of war, and we want the means of filling these con-tracts. Our motto is, "Muskets, and prisoners to show for them in ninety days." We don't want palaces, but bullets and shelter tents. Money can now be used to a great advantage. Forty thousand shelter tents and thirty thousands knapsacks, with as many rifles, are the things we want, and a few thousand dollars will buy these now."
