There are many conflicting rumours about the trial of Jeff. Davis, but those best informed say that it will be postponed from June until October, when it will take place at Richmond.

Messrs. William B. Reed of Philadelphia and George Shea of New York have during the past week visited Fortress Monroe, as counsel for the arch-traitor, and have agreed with him as to the line of defence which

is thus shadowed forth. The witnesses for the prosecution are not to be cross-examined, except when their evidence may vary from the actual facts. No witnesses in all probability will be examined on the part of Mr. Davis. In other words, his counsel will not deny that he was the elected President of the seceding States, and may argue, not at any very great length, first, that he was bound to obey the command of his State, and secondly, that the confederate States clearly had a constitutional right to withdraw from the Union, there being no uch thing as secession. This it is probable will be the entire defence on the

trial. Perhaps, for the issue appears very doubtful, the jury may convict Mr. Davis. If so, appeal will be at once taken and the case brought before the United States Supreme Court, where it will be argued before the full bench by Messrey O'Connor and Shea of New York, Pugh of Cincinoatti and Reed of Philadelphia. 
