of naturalization. Complaints of misgovernment in Ireland continually engage the attention of the British nation, and so great an agitation is now prevailing in Ireland that the British government have deemed necessary to suspend the writ of habeas corpus in

"These circumstances must necessarily modify the opinion which we might otherwise have entertained in regard to an expediton expressly prohibited by our neutrality laws. So long as those laws remain upon our statute books, they should be faithfully executed, and if they operate harshly, unjustly or oppressively, Congress alone can apply the remedy, by

In regard to the relations of the United States with Great Britain he intimates they are not very fearful in their aspect.

"It is a matter of regret," he says, "that no considerable advance has been made towards an adjustment of the differences between the United States and Great Britain arising out of the depredations upon our national commerce and other trespasses committed during our sivil war by British subjects, in violation of international law and treaty obligations. The delay, however, may be believed to have resulted in no small degree from the domestic situation of Great Britain. An entire change of ministry occurred in that country during the last session of Parliament. The attention of the new ministry was called to the subject at an early day, and there is some reason to expect that it will now be considered in a becoming and friendly spirit. The importance of an early disposition of the question cannot be exaggerated. Whatever might be wishes of the two governments, it is manifest that good will and friendship between the two countries cannot be established until a reciprocity, in the practice of good faith and neutrality, shall be restored between the respective nations."

PRICES, says the Watchman & Reflector, continue to tend downward, though the changes are not great, save in the item of pork, which is six cents a pound lower than it was a year ago; and in lard, which is thirteen cents lower. Coal is considerably lower, but corn is higher. Butter has fallen ten cents a pound, but flour is dearer, -so that you may not have bread to your butter. Prices are more than twice as high as they were six years since, or about fifty per cent. higher reckoned by the gold standard. Such is our share of the evils of the war.

New YORK, Dec. 7. The Fenian Senate met last night, and although privacy is rigidly observed by all connected with the meeting, enough transpires to show that the leaders favor an immediate movement in Canada. It is not known, however, when the campaign will commence, but it is openly stated that 20,000 men are ready to take the field.

QUEBEC, Dec. 7. The Montreal Transcript learns from a reliable source that from 15,000 to 17,000 rifles were sold in this city on Fenian account within a few days. Destination unknown.

TORONTO, Dec. 7. In the matter of the condemned Fenians, the Sheriff to-day received instructions from the Government to make no preparations for the executions, inasmuch as a respite is granted until the 13th March.
