The New York Times says it has recently heard of not a few English capitalists having invested in the establishment of cotton manuafacturers in the South. South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama are reported by the agents of English houses to hold out especially inviting opportunities for investment. The cotton tax acts as an inducement to cotton manufacturing in the South, for cotton escapes the tax altogether when manufactured in the collection districts in which it is raised; and the difference of three cents a pound constitutes a serious item, one way or the other, in setting the price of goods per yard.
