If the Government be sustained, what their plan for confederating the Provinces will be we have no means of knowing. But as the doctrine of Confederation was advocated both in the Governor's Speech and in the Reply, and as so large a majority of the members have expressed themselves as friendly to Confederation, with proper checks, we shall look for an improvement upon the Quebec Scheme, and for active and persevering endeavour to accomplish this most important object with the least possible delay.

ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

ARRIVAL OF THE "CHINA."

HALIPAX, March 27. The China, Inglis, left Liverpool at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 19th, and Queenstown on the 18th and arrived at Halifax at 8.30 p.m., 27th. She has 46 Halifax and 66 Boston passengers.
On the day the steamer sailed, being Saint Patrick's

Day, fears existed that the Fenians might attempt a threatened demonstration. Little importance was, however, attached to the matter, and it was felt that if anything did happen the Government would be found fully prepared.

A late telegram from Leeds says, that in consequence of rumors of an expected Fenian outbreak, the city police had been largely augmented, while a large number of Volunteers and 600 tradesmen had been sworn in as special constables. Secret drilling

The Times of the 17th, in announcing that the Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and British North America, had terminated that day, says that American fishermen will be duly warned and enforced. For this purpose a British war vessel will be stationed to see that the rights of fishery, which revert to the British Crown, are not infringed, and also to prevent collisions between the fishermen of the Provinces and of the United States. In this as well as in all that relates to Fenianism the Times believes that the British Government may count on the friendliness and courtesy of President Johnson's Govern-

In the House of Commons on the 16th, the Government proposition for a uniform oath to be taken by the members of Parliament, was taken up. Sir Geo. Grey said that the Government would agree to the first and second clauses of D'Israeli's proposed amendment, provided the word "defend" was struck out in deference to objections raised by Quakers. D'Israeli agreed to omit the obnoxious word, and then moved the third clause of his amendment, which proclaims the absolute supremacy of the Queen, and rejects the jurisdiction of either Prince or Prelate. The Government opposed this clause as a mere abstract and incongruous formula. After some debate the amendment was rejected by 286 to 222, majority for Government 14. The oath proposed by the Government as modified in first two clauses by D'Israeli, was then

In the House of Lords, on the 16th, Earl Grey, in a long speech upon Irish grievances, moved that the House, on the 20th, should go into committee upon his resolutions to consider the state of Ireland. A debate ensued. Earl Russell deprecated attempt to carry out the violent remedies proposed by Earl Grey, as likely to create unprecedented agitation in the country. He preferred gradual and well considered reforms. Grey's motion negatived.

In the House of Commons, Layard said assurances had been received from Spain, Chili and Peru, that vessels now building in England should not leave until pending difficulties were settled.
The chances of Reform Bill continue subject of ac-

tive discussion. Conservative journals demand its rejection; others call for amendments. The Daily Telegraph declares it is growing quite clear that the bill will become law. The real crisis of the measure was its first appearance, which it passed safely.
