THE DUCHIES -Austria has declared against the entry of the Prussians into Holstein, declaring such a step to be a violation of the Gastein Convention. The Prussians have occupied Bramstedt, Horst, and Itzhoe, and will occupy immediately Glucktards and Elmshorn. Gen. Monteuffer had arrived at Itzhoe. Prussia has appointed Baron Scheel Plessen, President of Schleswig Holstein. He has issued a proclamation stating that Gen. Monteuffel will proceed against any acts which Prussia regards as illegal on the part of the former Government or the Estates about to meet. The opening of the Estates is expec-ted with much anxiety. Prussia will not permit the meeting in any part of Holstein. General Monteugel has issued a proclamation stating that the King of Prussia intends in conformity with the principle of this unity of both duchies to convoke the Estates Schleswig Holstein, in order to prepare for the unity.
